2008 Gold Coast Open Teams

A fantastic total of 274 teams contested the Open Championship, and about another 150 teams in Restricted events. From that 274, only the top 6 would qualify for the quarter-finals, with the top 2 going straight through to the semi-finals.

A Chinese representative team took one final place and the other was taken by the Irish Internationals (Tom Hanlon & Hugh McGann) who had earlier won the Open Pairs, and Kate McCallum from the USA playing with Australia's adopted son, Paul Marsden. The final was won by the composite Irish/USA/Australian team.

Tony Jackman, Meta Goodman, Wynne Webber, Sue Lusk, Therese Tully and myself had some success, mixed with failure at the wrong time, and when we ended with a bad loss, we just finished in the top third of the field. At one stage we were playing at table 272, but this was not because we were doing badly, but because an ACT of enthusiastic Juniors was doing well. Against us they went astray a few times by forgetting their artificial system at crucial times.

Our most satisfying result was against Murray Green's team, which included the Chinese pair which recently won the World Open Pairs, and in a very low scoring match we ended up on the right side of a winning draw. As usual with a 6-man team I did not play all of the matches and will confine my report to those matches that I did play.

On board 16 in match 2 I had a minor scare at the thought of possible bad things about to happen when Tony opened 2D, to show 4 spades, at least 4 hearts, many other distributions in the minors, and 11-15 HCPs.

After a few anxious seconds I hit upon the obvious answer and passed, hoping Tony was not 4504.

He was a little surprised at my pass, as it rarely happens, but settled down when he saw dummy and managed to make 10 tricks when all suits behaved for +130.

At the other table Wynne and Meta had a 1C opening, allowing a 1S overcall, but the final contract of 2S proved 1 too high for -100, but still a paltry 1 Imp to us.

On board 19 in match 2 Tony opened with a forcing 1C and my 2C showed just 5-8 HCPs. My first instinct was to jump to 5C, but with such a long suit, I needed very little to make slam.

When Tony showed his heart suit and South showed some values I gave up on slam, although from the 2S support it was likely that he had only 1 or 2 spades, and simply bid game in my long suit.

When North bid 5S, my pass was forcing to a certain extent, and Tony, without good support and a minimum of high cards for his 1C bid, elected to defend.

I led the HJ, won by Tony with the HA to lead a small diamond, an unbid suit. Declarer could deduce from the opening 1C bid that Tony had the DA, and did not want to let me win the DQ, so rose with the DK which I ruffed, and had to lose 2 further diamonds for +300.

At the other table, EW continued on to 6C, which went off 1 for another +100 and 9 lmps.

On board 15 in match 4 we seemed to have missed a golden opportunity, but as so happens in teams matches, the pair at the other table did not even get to slam so bidding 7S would have gained us very little, and as others found out when they did not take the right line, the penalty is high if you go off in a grand slam.

My 2NT response shows a balanced 8-10, and Tony's 3C was Stayman, but 3H does not deny a 4-card spade suit, so Tony could have bid 3S instead of 6NT, and I would have been able to cue-bid hearts on the way to a possible grand slam.

In 7S, declarer must cash the top 2 spades, and when the SJ falls, he can pitch a diamond on the 3rd club and ruff the 4th club low. Next lead to the HK and return to the DK to lead the HA for a diamond discard.

Finally lead to the DA and ruff a diamond with the ST while East watches helplessly and dummy takes the last 2 tricks. At the other table NS played in just 4S, so we gained 13 lmps.

On board 22 EW got themselves into trouble when West doubled my 3D (single-suiter) for take-out, but East thought it was a penalty double, so passed it out. In our system, 2D shows any single-suiter, but since that entails a 3-level bid if it is a minor, we leave 2D for good hands in a minor, and use weak-jumps otherwise.

Actually EW are already too high, with 4 top losers in a club contract, but 1NT had at least 7 tricks so 3D is okay even if 1 off. As it is, even though 4C is 1 down (probably doubled), is still better for EW than 3DX making.

In 3DX I had no worries, and when East did not find the double-dummy defense of underleading her club honours for West to lead a heart through, I made 10 tricks for +570.

At the other table, the opening bid was not 1NT, so South was able to overcall 1S, whereupon NS pushed all the way to 4SX, which went 2 off for +300 and 13 Imps.

On board 14 in match 5 after East opened 1NT (15-17) we stayed out of game on our combined 24 count, and were rewarded when game is not on.

My 2D showed a single-suiter, 2H was correctible, and 2S was passed out. East led the H5.

Since all of the outstanding high cards are marked by the opening 1NT, 2S was never in jeopardy, and in a desperate effort to beat 2S, after winning the SQ East led the DK and followed up after winning the SA with the CA, so I made 10 tricks for +170.

4S goes off with an opening club lead, as East can give his partner a ruff before trumps can be drawn. Even a club switch after winning the SQ will lead to a club ruff and only 9 tricks.

At the other table, Therese and Sue were playing a weak 1NT, so the opening bid was 1C, and somehow NS contrived to get to 3NT, which had no chance on a club lead. This was +6 Imps in a match won by 14-12 against teams 2.

He now bid a natural 3C, but probably expecting me to have a 6-card suit, converted my belated 3NT to 4H. North led the D2 to 4H and I could see how 4H was a slightly superior contract to 3NT, but neither game was a good bet. First to get rid of the diamond loser (at least the diamonds looked to be 4-3), so I played 2 rounds of spades, won the diamond return and discarded my diamond loser on the SJ. A successful diamond ruff and I was in dummy to take the trump finesse, but which one to finesse for? I was very relieved when South covered the H9 with the HJ and my HQ won the trick. With the hearts well placed +620 was the result but only 1 Imp as 3NT at the other table was unbeatable

It looked good for a while, as I was able to crossruff twice in dummy and twice in my hand before North came into the play, but when I led a spade for the 3 rd ruff in dummy, North could pitch a diamond and then over-ruff me in diamonds. The heart exit left me with no resort, as no matter what South did, I had to lose 2 more trumps and -100. With the obvious misfit, we would have obviously been better to have played in just 4C, but at least we did better than EW at the other table, who got to the awful contract of 3NT, finishing 3 off for +300 to us and 5 Imps.

In 4HX at the other table, declarer had no chance, and finished 4 off for -800, Deep Finesse even suggests that EW can make 7 tricks in hearts on their 3-3 fit, probably because South gets trump-bound. Over 1H I overcalled 2D, and North was forced to pass, allowing Tony to bid 2S, which was forcing for 1 round. If I had 6 diamonds, I would have forced to game with 3H, but lacking the length, I compromised by bidding 3S, hoping my SA would make up for the lack of a 3 rd trump. Tony would have been better to bid 3NT with his good hearts, but instead bid a normal 4S, which must have sparked North's interest, but no double was forthcoming. This contract went 2 off for another -100 and 14 Imps away.

This would have doubtless seemed like a good idea looking at 3 quick tricks and a possible heart trick, but the diamond tricks were not real, as North found out when she led the DA! With North on lead there was no way for NS to get a heart trick, and Tony finished with 11 tricks for +990. After ruffing the DA declarer can establish the clubs for a heart discard before leading trumps. Even if by some systemic flaw East was declarer, allowing South to lead a heart, EW still have 10 tricks. At the other table NS elected to bid over 4S, and conceded -500 in 5HX for 10 Imps.

Nothing really appeals with that singleton club, as surely South will bid clubs in response to a take-out double, but I am sure that not many others would elect to pass with 3 Aces and a King! North elected to pass and await developments, but there was no more action! South was not inclined to bid on such minimal values, although I am sure most others would, and North led a small diamond. I think that South forgot to evaluate Tony's hand as having a maximum of 15 HCPs, so North was marked with quite a good hand. To make matters worse, NS contrived to let Tony make 9 tricks for +110. At the other table our NS were not so restrained and finished in 4H for 10 tricks and +420. +11 Imps

On board 7 in match 9 we were gifted a huge swing when South was not fully conversant with the rules of the game. Tony's double showed the red suits, and South's 3C was a Bergen raise. On an earlier hand North had forgotten Bergen raises, but the error had not been costly. Then a few short boards later, South tried her hand again with a Bergen raise, and again North forgot. This time it was very costly as the final result was 6 down for +1700 to us. Since the result at the other table had been 11 tricks in 5S for +650, that was a massive 20 lmps. The problem with the rules was that South knew that North had forgotten Bergen again when she bid 5C, but did not realize that she was perfectly entitled to correct 5C to 5S, especially after the double. In the end she passed and complained aloud about North forgetting Bergen, but this of course makes it difficult North for to correct her mistake if she had woken up. However I think she did not realize it.

On board 27 in match 10 we had a lucky escape when I initially doubled 1NT for penalties, rescued by Tony, but then thought I had enough to double 3NT when EW kept bidding, pass forces a redouble. Against 3NTX I led the HK (a mistake) and was disappointed to see dummy's spades as well as 8 points, which meant very little for Tony's hand, and I was resigned to writing down -550.

I could count 8 tricks, including 2 in spades for declarer, but what was I going to throw on the clubs? Still maybe declarer would try another line or have a club loser, so I exited with the SK.

Declarer made no mistake with playing the clubs for 4 tricks, and on the 4th club I was squeezed in 3 suits, having already pitched a heart and spade. Whatever I pitch is a telling card, if a heart declarer can exit to my bare Ace, if a diamond declarer can duck a diamond for 9 tricks, and if a spade, declarer can duck a spade to me and the forced diamond return gives up my second diamond trick.

In the end declarer cashed the DK before exiting with a spade so we got an undeserved +100. At the other table, NS found their spade fit and conceded only 300 in 4SX, but 10 Imps to us.

On board 28 in match 10, the last of the tournament, we finished on a low point when Tony elected to bid hi fine sui, possibly looking for slam, instead of 3S, asking me to bid 3NT with a spade stopper.

My 1C was Precision, and Tony's 3D was a positive response with diamonds, so I only got to show my good 6-card suit for the first time at the 3-level!

3NT makes 11 tricks from either hand, but in 4H EW did not make any mistake and I went 2 off.

Eats led the SA and continued with the SQ, but West did not make the mistake of ruffing my loser with his winning trump, so I won in hand to play 2 rounds of trumps.

I am still cold if West has the top 2 trumps, as EW cannot cash a spade trick, but no luck and the contract was off. 5D fares no better on a spade lead as East can cash 2 tricks and give his partner a ruff.

At the other table there was no spade overcall (?) and on the club lead South made 13 tricks in 5D.
