## 2008 Queensland Open Teams by Richard Wallis

A total of 34 teams contested this year's Open Teams Championship at Toowong Bridge Club on the middle weekend in May, which seemed a few more than when I last played in the event in 2006. This year our team consisted of Richard Ward, Lindy Vincent, Sue Mabin, Therese Tully and myself. Why 5, well Richard Ward had school duties on Sunday and we were lucky enough to get Sue to take his place.

When the field was posted it looked like Braithwaite (Andy Braithwaite, David Appleton, Neville Francis & Magnus Moren) was going to be the team to beat, and so it proved when we finished ahead of them by 7 VPs, but 23 VPs ahead of the 3<sup>rd</sup> placed team.

The win/draw/loss of our team was not the best, with 6/1/1, whereas teams 1 & 4 had 7 wins and 1 loss, but out loss was only by 3 lmps (14-16) to team 1, and we had 4 wins of 25-5 or better. We started Sunday in the lead by 3 VPs, but a 14-16 loss to Braithwaite reduced our lead to just 1VP, and then a draw in our next match saw us behind Braithwaite by 7 VPs with just 2 matches to be played.

However, we had a 25 to their 19 on the 7<sup>th</sup> match to reduce the deficit to just 1VP, and then our final match was another 25 to their 17 and we were home. Thanks are due to the 2 teams that restricted them to small wins for the last 2 matches, as without that our 2/25s would have been to no avail.

Transfers after the 1NT opening bid have taken off since they were invented many years ago, but like most artificial systems, they can bite if not used properly.

South bid 2NT instead of 3C as a transfer to diamonds, and then she had nowhere to go. The 3D bid should have warned North that South was unbalanced (at least showing 5 clubs and 4 diamonds), but he pressed on the 3NT anyway.

I led the obvious HT, and we took the first 5 tricks, after which Therese led a club, and North won the CA and led the top 2 diamonds, finding bad news again.

The spade finesse now lost, and we had 8 tricks ourselves, with a 9<sup>th</sup> emerging from nowhere for +500 due to careless discarding by declarer. At the other table Lindy mis-guessed the trumps to go off in 5D, but still 9 Imps to us.

Ironically, if NS can make North declarer in 6C, it is also on the diamond guess.

Therese carefully chose 2NT over my 2S to allow me to complete my hand pattern, and when I rebid spades, raised to game in that suit.  I ruffed the opening lead of the CA and took the diamond finesse as I had no hope without that, and then I cashed the DA (a mistake) and when South did not drop the DK I ruffed a diamond back to hand.  Next I cashed the HA and led the HQ for effect, but when it was not covered I ruffed in dummy and ruffed a club and another heart and a club finishing in hand to lead a 4 <sup>th</sup> heart. Since I only had 1 trump left in each hand South could ruff with the SK and lead a trump, and North would take the last 3 tricks with trumps for 1 off. However he discarded the CJ and the ST was my 10 trick, and the club off the table was ruffed small by North and the SQ was my 11 trick. Board 25 in match 6 was the disaster that often kills a teams chances, or at least their morale.  We had recently changed some aspects of the system and I was not sure what the 4S bid meant, as since it was a jump in a new suit, it could have been a splinter agreeing diamonds, or as it was a jump into game, a fit-showing bid.  I decided that either way it should show diamonds, so I had any easy sacrifice over 5C. The double by South shook my convictions a lot, and I almost pulled it to 5S, but that would have been disasterous if it was a splinter, so in the mess I stayed.  At the other table they played in 5C making 12 tricks for +420, so 5 off and -1400 was 14 Imps away instead of only 2 Imps for 2 off in 5SX.  Luckily we scraped up enough on the other boards to hold it to a 2 Imps loss, 15-15 in VPs.

After a similar start to the auction, West at the other table must have been looking at some other cards as they bid 4NT in response to the 4S opening, or maybe it was a bluff bid to deter NS from entering the auction on their likely 10-card heart fit.  Sue showed great restraint when West signed off in 5S following the 5C response to 4NT, and how right she was! Neither of her red AKs took a trick, the only defensive trick being Lindy's CA.  The results that I saw had one team gaining a swing from doubled spade contracts, sometimes at the 4-level. I did not hear of any, but there must have been a few 1210s that were flat.  When I saw dummy I was concerned about a possible club ruff, so ruffed the heart lead and drew another round of trumps before leading the CK, but if I had been prepared to rely on a 2-1 break in trumps, could have ruffed all the hearts.
