2010 Qld Open Teams by Richard Wallis

The 32 teams for this year's event was a reasonable turnout, and the quality of the field was almost as good as it gets in our home state. A few notable local players were busy interstate or at International events, but most of the 'known' Qld players were present, as well as few up and coming players.

This year I played in the teams with Tony Jackman, along with Richard Ward playing with Bill Hunt. We plugged along with 3 wins before hitting a sight snag with a draw against Robson (Mike Robson, Betty Lee, Charlie Howard, Kerry Wood), but as other matches were also close, still finished the first day with a narrow 1 VP lead.

First up next morning a modest win against Francis (Neville Francis, Nathan Van Jole, Peter Hainsworth, Kamal Sanmugaras) saw us knocked off the top spot, before a big loss to McLeish (David & Paula McLeish, Gary & Jan Malinas) in match 6 put them in the lead and us back in the chasing pack. We needed 2 maximum wins to have a chance and even then, having already lost to the leaders, we needed things to go our way.

The 7th match was the maximum win we needed, but while we started the last match in 2nd place, we were 10 VPs behind the leaders, McLeish, so we were still up against it for the last match.

Luckily for us, McLeish were playing Francis, who were coming a close 3rd, so it was all up for grabs. We got our maximum, and Francis ground out a 19-11 win against McLeish, which was not enough to propel them to second, but enough for us to claim top spot again.

On board 2 in the first match North got a little carried away with the great support for her partner, and sacrificed at unfavourable vulnerability.

I almost opened 1H with my nice suit, but the singleton Jacks are of no value, so decided it does not hurt to have a good weak two for a change, although Tony may not believe it, or worse still may expect it all of the time!

However, my suit was not particularly relevant to Tony, as he had a 7-card suit of his own, and expecting his 3S to be at least a 6-card suit, I had no hesitation in supporting with my doubleton.

North now could guess she had a possible trump trick, and at most 1 diamond trick, so she sacrificed with 5D without thinking about the vulnerability!

South had 5 losers at the beginning, with nowhere to park any of them, so ended up 3 down for +800 to us, more than adequate for +420.

Two suited overcalls can be a very valuable defensive weapon, but as North found out on board 10 in the third match, they can also be very expensive when there is a misfit.

South's 2NT was clearly for the minors, and Tony's double was for penalties, so his pass of 3D was forcing. It looks like we can make a game, but the 2NT bid signalled bad breaks were likely, so I settled for what was available in 3D by doubling.

North thought long and hard about pulling 3DX to his 6-card suit, but South may even be void in hearts, so settled for the known 5-2 fit instead. He was clearly disappointed when dummy went down.

When you have more points than the opponents you have to cut down on ruffs, so I led the DT, and North put up a futile DQ in dummy for Tony to win and return the D7. North led a third trump and exited with a heart, and Tony switched to the S2, so I was able to draw another trump.

Dummy was endplayed and forced to lead away from the clubs so North finished 4 down for +1100. Because of the bad breaks, 3NT was little chance and finished 2 down at the other table for 16 Imps.

On board 14 in the third match Tony's 2D response was forcing for 1 round, and since it denied a major suit, my 2S rebid only showed a stopper and also denied a heart stopper.

North led the HJ, and Tony could see 9 tricks at once, so had a very easy time. He won the first trick, and immediately forced out the DA, upon which North lead another heart.

Tony now cashed his diamond tricks, followed by the SA, and then the CA for his 9th trick, and with the appearance of the CK he then had 10 tricks for +430.

With both major suit finesses working (only the heart finesse was important) and the stiff CK, 6D is cold, but this is one slam we did not mind missing.

At the other table EW came to a premature stop in 2C, making just 9 tricks for -110 and 8 lmps.

On board 16 in the fourth match I had a difficult decision after Tony made a limit raised as a passed hand. Probably I should have passed since he could not dredge up 11 points to open.

However, I had good controls albeit a poor suit, so I hoped he could plug a few gaps and bid game anyway. At MPs I would have passed, but the premium for bidding vulnerable games is worth the risk.

It was obvious I had made the right decision when dummy went down after South led the DQ, so I won on the table and led a trump, South winning and leading another diamond.

When North won the HA NS still had a spade trick to come, but he led a club, and I could pitch both of my spades on dummy's clubs for 11 tricks and +650.

At the other table the limit raise was not looked at with such rosy views, and declarer made 10 tricks for -170, but 10 Imps to us.

When South opens 2NT with the South hand, and you have the flat 3-count as North had on this hand, I think it is a clear-cut pass, with a valiant hope that partner can make 8 tricks. However, both tables finished in 3NT by South, going 2 down at our table, and 1 down at the other table for 3 Imps to us. I think that for every time you gain 10 Imps by getting to game with the North cards, you will lose 6 Imps on at least 4 other hands.

On board 28 in the eighth match I had some interest in slam after Tony showed a strong hand, but when he bid in my void suit for the 2nd time I gave up on slam and settled for just game.

I did not mention spades since I only wanted to play in spades if Tony bid the suit first.

When I bid 4H, Tony realized that his singleton spades and HK was very useful, so he took over and bid the slam.

The diamond lead was awkward, as it took away my later entry to dummy, so my line of play had to involve ruffing at least 1 spade before drawing trumps.

I won the DA, discarded a diamond on the CA, and ruffed a spade in dummy with the H3 then cashed the HK before pitching my other spades on the top clubs, and it did not matter if someone ruffed as then there would only be 1 trump left and my HA would drop it.

However, South forgot to ruff the CQ, so when I ruffed a diamond to hand to draw the last trump, they both dropped and I had 13 tricks for 1 Imp. Since hearts were 2-2, ruffing a club at trick 2 and drawing trumps finishing in dummy takes all of the tricks.
