## 2012 Barrier Reef Teams by Richard Wallis

The 2012 BRC was held in Cairns from $8^{\text {th }}$ June to the $11^{\text {th }}$ June, and the Teams started on Saturday afternoon following completion of the Eric Parson's Pairs in the morning. The 48 teams contesting the Open Teams this year was slightly up on 2011, but the entry for the Restricted Teams was slightly down.

The standard in the Open was very high, in spite of competition from the VRC held in Melbourne at the same time, and while the eventual winners, (Nathan Van Jole, Andy Braithwaite, David Beachamp and Phil Gue) skipped away to a good lead with 1 match to play, there were quite a few teams vying for the minor placings in the final match, and even Van Jole could have been relegated to $4^{\text {th }}$ with a very bad loss.

In a promoters dream, the final match-ups had team $1\left(6^{\text {th }}\right) \vee 3\left(5^{\text {th }}\right)$, team $2\left(1^{\text {st }}\right) \vee 4\left(2^{\text {nd }}\right)$ and team $28\left(3^{\text {rd }}\right)$ v team $19\left(4^{\text {th }}\right)$. The Van Jole team (\#2) lost their only match 12-18, but still averaged just over 20 VPs per match to win by 4 VPs from team 28 (Fred Whittaker, Neil Stuckey, Barry Jones and Jenny Middleton) who won their last match 25-3 to average just under 20 VPs per match. Team 4 (Richard Ward, Lindy Vincent, Therese Tully, Pele Rankin and Paul Hooykaas) won their last match against the leaders 18-12, but with their rivals getting bigger wins, had to be content with equal $3^{\text {rd }}$ with my team 3 (Richard Wallis, John Brockwell, Annette Maluish and Neville Francis).

As usual, a very enjoyable event, and I look forward to Mackay in 2013, still in June due to venue problems, but with the State Government talking about reverting to the Queen's Birthday holiday in June again, we do not know when we will be playing in 2014. If it could be moved away from the VRC, it could only get bigger.



On board 8 in the first match, West's 2 H opening bid showed that suit and a minor, with $5-5$ and less than an opening hand, and East's double asked for the minor suit.
I would like to have shown both of my suits, but since West could have clubs, I bid what was in front of me and John raised to game.
East led the HQ, covered on the table, and West cashed the top hearts and led a $3^{\text {rd }}$ heart.
Since any spade length is certain to be with East, I did not ruff, instead discarding a club, and since the H9 in dummy was high, East was forced to ruff and I then had no trouble taking the rest of the tricks for +420 .
When the SJ dropped in the West hand, that looked like 1 Imp away, but at the other table after a similar start Annette and Neville stole the hand in 3D, which made exactly for +110 , and 11 Imps after all.

Board 22 in the second match was a case of not watching the bidding properly (we are Seniors after all), and East took full advantage of the mix-up and bad break with a double.
John and I had agreed that a cue-bid after partner opens or overcalls shows at least a limit raise in partner's suit, and that is what John thought he was doing by bidding 2C!
Since West opened 1D, I read 2C as natural, and raised with what I thought was good support, in spite of John having previously passed.
John, realizing his mistake, corrected to 3S, but I went on to game based on my good fit for clubs.
East told me something was wrong when he doubled the final contract, and after the lead of the DQ, John was able to fill me in on his 2C bid.
I could not avoid the 5 obvious losers, and finished 2 down for -300 , which was 9 Imps away compared to 2 S just making at the other table.

On board 25 in the second match neither John nor I knew what West was up to, and neither of us risked a double of the final contract. After all, EW were vulnerable, so it was difficult to envisage West with so many losers.
When dummy went down I was amazed at the East hand for the 3C opening at adverse vulnerability, and also very disappointed at the 3cards in hearts and the doubleton spade.
Looking at all of the hands, 5 H should be 2 off via the top cards in clubs and spades and the trump promotion via the $3^{\text {rd }}$ club, which is 5 Imps away as it was obvious that 5D was cold.
The damage was lessened when declarer failed to lead any trumps before attempting to ruff a spade in dummy, and John made a trick with his HJ before executing the trump promotion for +300 .
At the other table Neville knew that 5 H would be too expensive, so subsided in 5D, making 11 for +400 , but 3 Imps away.

Board 28 in the second match was my worst hand of the tournament, which looks odd considering the layout and the final contract of 6SX.
Even at adverse vulnerability, I had no hesitation in bidding 4S over the 1 H opening, but East ignored my bid and asked for Aces.
John doubled 4NT, to get in their way in case they had not discussed responding to 4NT after a double, and because he always intended to bid again.
Over 6 H , John took the winning position when he bid 6S, and was not surprised when West doubled. I am sure that he was expecting me to go down, but if 6 H made, 6SX would be cheaper, and he was very pleasantly surprised when I ruffed the opening lead of the DK.
After ruffing with the $S 7$ at trick 1 , I ruffed a heart in dummy and led another diamond intending to ruff with the S8 and ruff another heart, but to my horror, I noticed the H8 on the table instead of the S8. One off instead of making cost us 7 Imps instead of gaining 17 when Neville and Annette were allowed to play in 6 H at the other table.

Now she could not make 10 tricks, and played 2 rounds of diamonds, ruffing in hand to lead a club, ruffing on the table. <br> The final position is not clear, as the contract was recorded as 2 off, but it appears as if it is impossible for us to make 5 tricks, so either declarer was too generous, or the contract should have been only 1 off. <br> At the other table Neville and Annette stopped in 3S, but made no mistake in the play to record 10 tricks and +170 for 7 Imps. |

On board 6 in the third match I had good shape and the vulnerability was in our favour, so I was determined to bid out my shape.
I expected West to double 2C for takeout, and could then bid 2 H to show both my suits early in the bidding, and was surprised when West bid 2 S instead.
Still, 3H now seemed automatic, and I expected that this showed my 6-5 shape, thus John would either double EW in their game contract, or bid one of my suits as a sacrifice.
To my surprise 3S by East was passed around to me, and I had no reason to bid any more.
West made the obvious 10 tricks for -170 , and were hopefull of picking up a game swing.
At the other table Neville and Annette did get to 4 S , and NS did sacrifice in 5C, doubled by Annette, and this went for +800 , so we actually gained 12 Imps .


On board 13 in the third match I opened with the North hand because I had an easy rebid of 2 C , and I had 2 Aces. I had a similar hand on board 9 in the same match, but that time with 5 clubs and 4 diamonds, so the easy rebid was not there and I passed.
East led the H6, and I won on the table to play the CK and set up a cross-ruff. It could have been important to lose the CA early, as if EW switched to a trump, I could keep the likely stronger hand (West doubled) out of the lead by ducking a spade to East.
Thanks to the kind trump position and spade break, even an initial trump lead cannot stop 3D, and I was untroubled to make 9 tricks for +110 .
At the other table NS got carried away with their 6-card spade suit and finished in 4SSX. Annette and Neville took full advantage of this by taking it 2 off for +500 and 12 Imps.

When the SK did not appear from West, I knew I could ruff a spade low on the table, especially when West played the SJ. It could be more difficult for me if West plays the SK under the SA, which is the card he is known to hold. <br> When the spades broke, I could cash the top diamonds and run the spades for a certain 10 or 11 tricks. <br> At the fall of the $D Q$, another diamond to dummy drew the last outstanding trump, and I led the HT off the table. When West made it easy by covering, I could claim 12 tricks for +170 . <br> At the other table the contract was also 3DN, but declarer made a few wrong guesses and only ended up with 9 tricks for -110, so we gained a lucky 2 Imps. |

On board 2 in the fifth match I missed a golden opportunity to put East to the test and flatten the board instead of losing 13 Imps.
When dummy went down 5 H looked to be almost $100 \%$, as if trumps behaved I could throw my club away on the SK, losing just a spade and a diamond. West won the SA at trick 1 and led the H7, and I was flabbergasted when the hearts turned out to be well placed, but unfinessable unless I had peeked.
Now is the time to start the thinking process again and look for a way to make 11 tricks after all, but I woodenly played a diamond and when East wisely flew up with the DA, I was one off.
However, I had a cost nothing play, that assumed after the weak-jump in spades that East has the CK, and I could have put East to the test at trick 4.
If I lead the CJ and East covers, I have only 1 discard, and must go down, so I lead the CT, and if East fails to cover, I can repeat the finesse and get 2 discards (SK first).

On board 17 in the sixth match I thought I was too good to open with 2 S or 3 S, so had a choice between 1 S or 4 S , and predictably chose the higher bid. I did this because if John had responded to a 1S opening, my next bid was likely to be 4 S to describe this type of hand, so I skipped a level of the bidding.
East had a look at dummy with the HA and led a trump to stop any club ruffs, and after West covered, I was hopefull of making 10 tricks or even 11 on a club switch, but after I had drawn trumps and led a heart, West cashed the top diamonds for 1 off.
At the other table North somehow contrived to play in just 2S, which made exactly for -110, and we had lost 4 Imps.
Unlucky to have the singleton CA opposite the singleton CK, but even if the CK had been protected, it was no good, and at least it prompted a spade switch from East.

West must have thought that all of his Christmas's has come at once on board 5 in the seventh match when I opened $2 S$ (weak!) and his partner doubled for take-out.
Dummy was a big disappointment to me, although there was an Ace and a King, until the HA got ruffed at trick 1 and I only had trumps left when the DK became good!
The Devil made me open $2 S$ with such a poor hand at adverse vulnerability, and I paid the full penalty for it. Try as I might, I could only make 3 trump tricks, which amounted to 5 off and -1400 to go with +430 from the other table in a 'normal' 3NT, and 14 Imps away.
Luckily for our team this was the last board of the match and we were well ahead in the match, but still it stopped us getting a 25.

He then made a slam try with 4NT but I had nothing extra. <br> I won the HK on the table at trick 1 and was surprised when West took the CQ at trick 2 and led a heart back, East winning and returning the suit. <br> East had played the C9 at trick 2, so by winning the first trick I placed West with AT53 and went to dummy with the SA and finessed the C8, winning the trick. On board 27 in the eighth match I did not take into account the recent teachings at various Brisbane locations on Losing Trick Count.
I knew I had a moderate hand, but let the diamond honours persuade me to go onto game. East, still hurting after a few earlier set-backs for him, tried to get something back and told me of my error by doubling.
If I had looked at my hand again before bidding game and counted losers, I have 9! Partner's jump raise will normally have 6 losers, so we have a total of 15 losers, and game is not a good bet.
East led the S7 and EW took 2 spades and the DK before I was in again with the DT, and then I led a heart to dummy and after some thought put in the H 9 and got the bad news. When the heart position was revealed, East commented that they had 3 tricks already and still had hearts to come.
3 off was inevitable for -500 and 8 Imps away when Annette did not want to give the heart position away by doubling the same contract.
