## 2013 QLD Open Teams

A total of 32 teams entered for the Open teams this year, and while not a maximum number for the Toowong Bridge Club's premises, it was still up there close to the maximum entry for the event. Teams from Rockhampton, Townsville and Toowoomba performed admirably, taking prizes in the various categories, and in the case of the Rockhampton team, outright third place.
As usual I played in the team with Lindy Vincent and Richard Ward, and this year my partner was Pele Rankin, playing the same 2/1 system that I now play with Therese. We were always in the mix for a place, but small losses to Jackman (match 4) and Cupples (match 5) made it difficult to overtake the Jackman team at the end. Jackman (Tony Jackman, Tony Hutton, Mike Robson and Betty Lee) defied all of us and led for most of the way, only suffering two small losses in the final 2 matches to enable us to close the margin to a respectable value.
We finished in second place, ahead of Cupples (Ken Cupples, Malcolm Allan, Malcolm Saunders and William Renton-Power). Each of the three place-getters had 6 wins and 2 losses, but Jackman had the most number of large wins, finishing one match 85 Imps ahead, but still only 25 VPs.
Toowong BC did us all proud, with copious amounts of food all day, and even fruit and sandwiches supplied at lunch. While some people still put in orders for sandwiches at lunch, I did not see the need for it with what was on offer all day.

Pele's AK of spades took no tricks. <br> At the other table West overcalled 2S after a weak 1NT opening, and played there for 3 off and another +300 and 9 Imps. |

| M 1 <br> Bd 12 <br> DIr W <br> Vul NS | Q98AQJT5AKT83 |  |  | On board 12 in the first match NS bid to the excellent spade game on minimal values, and I had to decide at my second turn to call whether to sacrifice or not? <br> This time North doubling first with the good hand worked out well, as a simple overcall in hearts at the other table consigned the spade suit to oblivion when Lindy was too weak to bid spades on her own. <br> I elected to sacrifice, but since the 1C by Pele could have as little as 3 clubs, I showed my long diamonds and 4-card club suit via 4NT. <br> North has to be careful to take all of her tricks quickly, as the diamonds set up for heart discards if she waits for a lead to her heart tenace. <br> Unfortunately she came out leading the HA and Pele had to go 1 off for - 100. <br> At the other table EW were able to buy the contract in 3D, making 9 tricks for -110 , so while I was right to sacrifice, we still lost 5 Imps. |

On board 17 in the second match I made a simple overcall of 1S, testing the waters and was pleasantly surprised when Pele gave me immediate support.
I felt that I had more than enough to leap to game now, but when South doubled, maybe I was wrong!
However, when trumps were 2-2, Pele had just enough to make South wrong for doubling.
The opening lead was the CK, and I tested trumps first and got some good news, now I needed something good to happen in diamonds, and South obliged by rising with the DA on the first round, easing all of my troubles.
It did not matter whether South rose with the DA or not, as I simply duck a diamond, and when the DA comes down on the next ruff, 10 tricks are there. At the other table East was not so optimistic, and stopped in 3S, so we gained 9 Imps.

However, the double is the winner, as picking the diamonds allows 5D to be made. <br> Declarer could have done better with a good guess in diamonds, but lost 2 clubs and a trick in each other suit to finish 1 off for +100 . The heart force leaves declarer without much resource, but 9 tricks are there double-dummy. <br> At the other table Lindy was able to show her good spade suit at a lower level, and allowed EW to play in 3H, undoubled and with only 8 tricks, this was another +100 for 5 Imps. |

After the simple raise of the opened suit, it looked like Kamal had some values, so I did not know which of the many lines available to adopt for 9 tricks. <br> If I rely on the diamonds behaving (3-3 or short DJ), the simple line is to play 3 rounds of hearts to set up the $9^{\text {th }}$ trick with the HT , relying on my club holding for protection in that suit. <br> If North has the values, there are other lines available, including the heart finesse, so I did not want to rely only on the diamond suit, but when I cashed the diamonds and found them to be $3-3$, I had to fall back on the heart finesse after all! <br> Luckily Kamal's meager values did include the HK, so I racked up 9 tricks for a flat board. |

Board 13 in the fifth match was the most bizarre I have encountered for a long time, and the bidding was even more bizarre, but who can argue with success?
I did not know what was likely to make, since I had a spade void, so instead of 4 H on my first turn to call, I temporized with a simple overcall of 2 H !
I assume that South was also temporizing with his 3D response, and was so delighted by the 5D rebid, that he leapt to slam.
From my point of view, things appeared to have taken a turn for the better, but I refrained from doubling with my 2 Aces, and then wished I had when the HA held up!
However, when I next tried to cash the CA, North ruffed and claimed a fast 12 tricks, for -1430.
Things got worse, as at the other table, EW climbed to 6 H , doubled, and Richard did not get his club ruff, so that was -1660, and 22 Imps away, surely a record for this event.

Board 12 in the seventh match was perfect for our 2 over 1 system. My 3D showed both minors and Pele's 3H agrees clubs, whereupon my 3S is a cue, showing first or second-round control, and 4C sets clubs, or it could have been Minorwood.
Not wanting to test the possible meanings for 4C, I bid what I thought we could make, namely 6C. If 4C was Minorwood, as I believed, then systemically I could have shown my odd number of Key Cards and a useful void, but we were in slam then anyway.
North rather strangely led the H4, and I was a little worried about my HK being exposed, but this worry was quickly eased when the HK won in dummy and Pele drew trumps and gave up the DK, her SA not being required.
Then I wished I had made the correct response, as if Pele had the DA and not the SA, 7C is cold! However, not to worry as they played only in 5C at the other table so we gained 11 Imps.

The eighth and last match was a low scoring affair, which did not give us the opportunity for a large win that would enable us to take the title, but board 21 has to go down as a missed opportunity through my lack of concentration.
My 1C opening could be short, but the 1 S rebid confirms both black suits, and Pele bid the obvious game.
The opening lead was the S5, and she had no trouble making 12 tricks for +490 and a 2 Imp gain over 5D making 13 tricks at the other table.
Where was the opportunity for a pick-up? Well in our system I had a strong 1NT opening and my 1S rebid had denied that strength, or the shape, which is why Pele did not go looking for slam.
Though not quite strong enough I could have even upgraded my hand and rebid 2NT instead of 1S, which would have seen us in slam for sure. After a 1NT opening Pele may have ended up in slam when I showed a maximum.
