## 2014 Seniors' Teams Playoffs by Richard Wallis

It has been my desire to participate in the playoffs for the Australian Seniors' team for a few years now, and in April 2014 it finally happened. Therese Tully and I earned our playoff points at the ANC Seniors' Teams and Butler in Adelaide in 2013, thus we were qualified to enter. 2014 is not a World championship year, thus a few of the fancied pairs did not enter, and there were some new partnerships, but 14 pairs fronted up at Coogee Beach in Sydney on $4^{\text {th }}$ April to contest the 10 places for stage 2, and a chance for this Year's Australian Seniors' team for the Asian Championship, Australia's only major event for 2014.
As expected, the field was pretty tough, with no easy-beats, and we had a see-saw stage 1 , coming home with 2 small losses followed by 2 good wins in the last 4 rounds to qualify in $9^{\text {th }}$ place. However, our best win, in round 13, was against a pair who then dropped from $9^{\text {th }}$ to $11^{\text {th }}$ and thus were eliminated, so we started stage 2 in last place, about 40 VPs behind the leaders, Peter Buchen and Henry Christie, who maintained that position until the end. The other 2 place-getters were Richard Brightling and David Hoffman, and Bruce Neill and Arjuna De Livera. Bruce and Arjuna loomed up from 10th place in Stage 1 to come $3^{\text {rd }}$ overall, a great result for them.
Stage 2 proved to be an even tougher event, and we made too many mistakes due to waning concentration to progress up the ladder to any great extent. The only results of merit in Stage 2 were good wins against the pairs who finished second and third. A loss on the last round to fellow Queenslanders, David and Paula McLeish, dropped us back to last place. In spite of the result, it was still a very enjoyable event and I look forward to playing again another year.

On board 18 in the second match Therese opened a natural weak 2 H , and South made a sporting double, which tempted me to be conservative and only raise to 3 H !
Now North got into the act and made a responsive double, over which South had no choice except to bid 4C. At least they found their 4-4 fit, but everything was wrong for them!
I led the SK, followed by the HT, and Therese overtook with the HJ and followed with the ST, which allowed me to give her a spade ruff with the S2, asking for a diamond return.
Now a diamond ruff completed the rout, and we had taken the first 8 tricks for 5 off and +500 .
This was not necessarily a major pick-up for us, as the good lie of the cards that enabled us to take 4C 5 off also would have enabled Therese to make 4 H , and also 3NT was cold, so only a potential 2 Imps. However the average was only +180 , so actually 8 Imps in.


On board 30 in the third match my 2NT overcall showed the red suits, and Therese was left in no-man's land, with only 3 red cards!
She obviously chose diamonds, and East led the SA, presumably to have a look at dummy before deciding on his next move, but dummy ruffed!
Two top clubs followed, and Therese next led a heart towards dummy and East ducked! Setting up the HK for a trick was no good to her, so she rose with the HK and ruffed a heart to hand to lead the SQ.
The SK was ruffed in dummy and another heart ruffed to hand to lead the SJ. Then the final spade ruff completed the first 9 tricks for our side, with a $10^{\text {th }}$ trick looming.
However EW were able to negotiate the diamond pips to take the last 4 tricks and limit our score to +110 . This was a modest 3 Imps in a losing match, as the board average was 0 .

On board 7 in the fourth match I could not bring myself to open 2 H with a 7 -card suit, so I bit the bullet and opened 3 H , as 4 H was too rich for me!
West was silenced, and Therese raised to game, which left East in the difficult position of having a good hand but no good bid.
He obviously chose 5D which was passed out, and I led the HT, won by Therese and she had 2 winning lines.
A diamond return allows us to cash 2 hearts, a diamond and a club, or a spade return gives us a spade ruff instead of the second heart trick, so the contract went 2 off for +200 .
We did not double, and it was just as well, as EW are cold for 5S, not that West was likely to take 5D out if it was doubled.
The double would not have gained much anyway, as many EWs did get to 4 S and the average was +310 , so we gained 11 Imps.

On board 18 in the fifth match I thought that I had a good, hand, but I needed support in at least one of my suits. While it looks like a 4-loser hand, the clubs could fall apart without some help, and the spades could easily have 2 losers.
West made a take-out double on my left, which seemed to make my clubs less useful, so when Therese gave forced preference, I meekly passed!
West led the H2, and when dummy tracked I knew we had missed game, unless everything was bad. Unfortunately everything was good, and I made 11 tricks for +200 .
It was hard for Therese to raise to game on what looked like meagre values, but they fitted my hand perfectly. They fitted so well in fact, that 5C was also cold.
Most pairs must have got to game, as the board average was -380, so we lost 5 Imps.

On board 21 in the sixth match North gave too much credit to her partner's overcall when she doubled our final contract of 5 H , in spite of Therese's strong bidding.
My 4H bid was not strong, generally only promising 5-card support, but Therese's hand had great potential so she made a slam try by bidding 5C.
The CK was definitely useful, but I could not fully value the SK, so I signed off in 5 H , and it looked like I had made the right decision when North doubled!
South led the ST, and Therese rose with the SK and led the HJ from the table. North made a reflex cover with the HK, and suddenly there were 12 tricks for +750 .
The board average was -450 , so we gained a big 7 lmps , which enabled us to win the match instead of having a small loss.

On board 23 in the sixth match Therese had a nice hand, but was outbid by North, which is just as well as 5 H fails by 3 tricks!
South's $2 S$ rebid did not guarantee a 6-card suit, which is why North bid her own suit rather than 4 S, which would have made at least 11 tricks, except on an unlikely club lead..
Therese led the HK, which by our agreements asks for reverse count, and my H5 was easy to read as an even number. Therese divined the hearts and switched to the CQ at trick 2, which I could encourage.
After the club switch declarer should have made 12 tricks if she had made the reasonable play of trying for 11 tricks by cashing the DA and then trying to pitch both of her clubs on spades before the hand with the DK ruffs in, since the DK drops, that would have been 12 tricks.
Instead declarer cashed 3 spades to pitch a club when they were 3-3, and then took the losing diamond finesse for 1 off and 12 Imps to us versus a board average of +540 .

On board 7 in the tenth match East made a speculative double when Therese bid game following my double of his 1S to show 3-card support for hearts.
This may have paid off, as if Therese only has a 5-card suit, East knows from his heart holding that West has 4 hearts, but not this time.
East led the D4, and when West won the DA he led back the S6 looking for a spade ruff to go with his probable club trick, but we had the spades!
Now Therese could win the SA and cash the HK before going over to the HA to expose the heart finesse and after drawing trumps could take the club finesse in comfort for 11 of 12 tricks.
When the club finesse lost that was only 11 tricks, but +990 against a board average of -560, so we gained 10 Imps.
Even on a diamond return there are 10 top tricks via the heart finesse, so we were booked for a 6 Imp gain anyway

On board 26 in the twelfth match the longest part of the board was in the bidding!
My 3S rebid after the 2 H response shows a near-solid suit able to play opposite a void for 1 loser at most, and Therese's 4C rebid was a cuebid agreeing spades. I had nothing more to say, so signed off in 4S, but then Therese used Key Card to find out I had 2 Key Cards and the SQ, thus I had to have the top trumps.
5NT was then a King ask, and 6C was my lowest (in fact my only) King. Therese concluded that since I had so little extra, I must have a seventh spade or the DK, so bid the Grand, expecting to be able to set up the hearts for 13 tricks if I did not have the HQ. It was highly unlikely that I had any more than 2 hearts on the bidding.
West led the DK, and there was nothing in the play. When all followed to the SJ on trick 2 and the CK on trick 3, I was able to claim 13 tricks for +2210 .
It looks easy to bid but only one other pair bid 7S, so the board average was +1610 , and we gained an unexpected 12 Imps.


On board 6 in the thirteenth match West must have been daunted by the $15-17$ points on his left, as he meekly passed my 1NT opening, as did Therese and East.
Since he had such a strong hand, it would seem like a good idea to have a look at dummy before leading to trick 2, so leading the HK (or HA) may point to a good defence!
However, West was made of sterner stuff and started off with the attacking lead of the SJ. This of course gave me a free trick, and mindful of spade length on my left, I firstly played off the top clubs in dummy, and then took the marked club finesse for 7 tricks and +90 .
An opening top heart lead would have been encouraged by East, and I would be squeezed by the run of the hearts and may then get the clubs wrong, limiting me to just 5 tricks, and -100. The board average was +70 , which gave us 4 Imps.

On board 22 in the third match of Stage 2, I ventured a Michaels cuebid to show both majors at adverse vulnerability, and NS brushed this aside to bid 3NT anyway!
Therese led the H7, and North called for the top heart, but I did not hear him, and thinking he had called for the H9, played the QJ under the HA!
There was no recourse and I thought that I had given him the contract. After the heart lead, 3NT has no chance, as I can win my Aces at the first opportunity and lead the HQ to set up the suit while I have the other Ace as an entry.
However, luckily for us declarer has no real chance to make 9 tricks in NT, and when he cashed the clubs and led the S9 off the table and put Therese in to lead another heart, we took it 1 off for +50 .
Since the Aces are well placed for declarer, 5C is cold and we had gained an unexpected pick-up. The board average was only +80 , but still it was 4 Imps against the pair who finished $3^{\text {rd }}$ overall.
