## 2015 ANC Seniors Teams by Richard Wallis

Our team of Therese Tully and myself, John Gough and Mike Pemberton, and Kerry Wood and Charlie Howard, with Terry O'Dempsey as NPC, started off the ANC Seniors Teams in Fremantle with high hopes of making the final. However, we were close all the time, but just dipped out at the end to finish $3^{\text {rd }}$, with the final between NSW (top qualifier) and VIC, won narrowly by NSW thanks to their carry-over.
The first match was against SA, whom we considered our strongest opponents, and a 27 Imp win got us off to a good start. Wins against ACT and WA1 followed to put us at the top, but a large loss to NSW in match 4 dropped us off the top of the heap, never to return.
Wins against TAS and WA2 followed, before another large loss to VIC completed the first round-robin. To allow WA1 and WA2 to play each other first up as per the conditions of play, our first match in the second RR was again NSW, and we had another moderate loss to consolidate their position at the top.
A big win against WA1 was followed by our repeat match against SA, who underperformed on the first day and were fifth after the first RR, but they got their revenge to push us back again. Big wins against WA2 and TAS brought us up to second again, before a small loss to VIC in the penultimate match pushed us down to $3^{\text {rd }}$.
Things were still in our favour however, as we were playing ACT in the last match and VIC were playing the high-flyers NSW, but it was not to be. Assured of the final, NSW rested their top ranked pair and VIC won by enough to ensure that our modest 1 Imp win against ACT was only enough for us to stay $3^{\text {rd }}$.
A great event, and a very convivial team, and maybe next year when it is at home, we can do better. Our thanks go to Terry, who tried his best, examining opposition systems in advance and trying to pit us for best advantage in matches where we had the choice. In the long run, we missed out by a mere 11 Imps, and if any of the unlucky results had not happened we would have been in the final, let alone eliminating just one of the costly mistakes.

On board 17 in the first match against SA, Therese's 1D opening showed at least 4 cards in the suit, and her 2NT rebid showed 18-19 balanced, without 4 spades.
My 3D rebid was game forcing, and the 3NT response denied both 4 hearts and 3 spades, so I bid the obvious 6NT, although I knew that with the right cards 7NT could be cold!
South led the H2 and I am sure that dummy looked good to Therese when it hit the table as we had a perfect fit, even down to the probably unnecessary ST!
Winning in dummy with the HA at trick 1, Therese proceeded to cash her top tricks, getting a surprize along the way at the $5-1$ spade break, and seemed to be giving some thought to maybe a double squeeze producing 13 tricks, but cashed out anyway, getting 13 tricks when the CQ came down without a squeeze.
This seemed like the surest flat board you would ever see unless EW got overboard and bid 7NT, but they inexplicably stopped in 3NT!

On board 3 in the second match against ACT we were disadvantaged by having South open with a multi-meaning 2D, and we had to wait until it was defined before acting on our minimum hands.
The $2 S$ rebid by South showed a weak hand with 5-5 in the black suits, and now Therese could show her heart suit, which prompted me to look for a spade stop for 3NT by cue-bidding 3S.
However when Therese rebid 4D, even though I had good support, I thought it was a likely 2 or even 3 spade losers, since North did not support spades, so against my better judgement I passed.
This was not a success, as the heart position was such that given the announced distribution, when South showed 2 diamonds, it was easy for Therese to set up the hearts with 1 loser and discard the spades in dummy for 12 tricks and +170 .
Not only had we missed a Vulnerable game as 3NT was also cold, but we had missed a Vulnerable slam! However, at the other table the final contract was 4 H , which went 1 off, so we gained 7 Imps!

On board 15 in the second match against ACT South opened with a weak 1NT, and I showed both majors with a 2C overcall.
If I had North's hand I would have shown a spade stop and asked South for a heart stop, but she made a unilateral decision and jumped to 5D, which was passed out.
Therese led the H4, and I cashed the HA and led to the HK for her to lead a spade, but that was it for us other than the CA. North drew trumps and led a club off the table to establish a discard for their spade loser, 1 off for +100 .
Opposite a weak 1NT, it looks easy enough to stay out of game with the NS cards, and 3D, or even 4D is likely, so we were expecting a modest pick-up, but John and Mike exceeded our expectations by getting to 3NT and making it! In fact, on the lead of the C2, they made 10 tricks for +630 .

On board 6 in the fourth match against NSW I opened with a strong 2C since I had 3 Aces and a likely 10 tricks in my hand and Therese showed at least 1 King with her 2D response.
South, having previously passed, now bid 2S, and rather than signing off in 4 H , I bid a forcing 3 H , to see if Therese had anything more than a King.
North now got involved with 3S, and Therese showed extras by bidding 5S (Exclusion Blackwood), so I bid the Grand slam over South's 6S rebid.
South now went into the tank and sometime later bid 7S, apologizing to his partner if it was wrong!
But he was not wrong, and the cost was only -500 , even a good save against 4H!
The Grand slam was bid at 4 tables in the Seniors, and only 2 NS pairs bid 7S over 7H, and likewise, a small slam bid at the other 4 tables only had 2 NS in 6 S, so we lost 17 Imps.

On board 16 in the fourth match against NSW we had a rare bit of good fortune in a large defeat.
My 1NT rebid showed 11-14, and Therese raised this rebid to game after first showing her 4-card heart suit.
North led the S4, and I won on the table to lead the DT, which held the trick. The hand was as good as over now as North discarded the C3 on this trick and 3NT could no longer be defeated.
I led another diamond and South rose with the DA and switched to a club, but NS could only cash 3 clubs now, so we scored +600.
At the other table the HT was led and a low spade was discarded on the first diamond, not a club, so John and Mike were able to cash 4 club tricks in addition to the DA for 1 off and +100 and 12 Imps.

On board 13 in the fifth match against TAS, I did not know what the potential of the hand was when Therese rebid 2 H after opening 1S, but I thought I would take the pressure off by bidding game and leave the defence to work it out for themselves.
My dilemma was that a void is generally an asset in a suit contract with a good fit, but not necessarily if partner has wasted honours, and that is a real possibility when partner has at least 5 cards in it. However, we were Vulnerable so I took the plunge and hoped for a favourable result since I had good hearts and a fair side suit.
Therese had some wasted values in spades, but a good card in diamonds and a fifth heart, so 10 tricks were easy and we scored up +620.
At the other table NS stopped in just 2 H , not even making a game try, so we gained 10 Imps .

On board 16 in the fifth match against TAS I decided to get into the action early on, which could be dangerous, but at least it was at favourable Vulnerability.
My 2C overcall showed the majors (general at least 5/4), and Therese invited with 3H, which I obviously rejected, and she was off to a good start when West led the C5!
East could have saved a trick by inserting the C7, but instead gave Therese 3 club tricks by playing the CJ at trick 1.
If trumps break, there now looks to be 9 tricks, by way of 3 clubs, 3 spades, 2 top hearts and a diamond ruff, so Therese led a heart to dummy and continued hearts when the HT won.
West now played 3 more rounds of hearts, and the total was possibly only 8 , until the spades broke. So we gained +140 to go with +120 from the other table, for 6 Imps.

On board 19 in the eighth match against NSW at the start of the second round-robin Therese used $4^{\text {th }}$ suit 2C to force to game, and when she showed a minimum of a 6-card heart suit, I valued my singleton HK highly enough to look for slam. Her 5 S response showed 2 Key Cards and the HQ, so it had to be slam.
South led the C3, and Therese won on the table, cashed the HK, and ruffed a diamond to hand, expecting to be able to take the spade finesse for 13 tricks!
When North showed out on the second heart, slam could not be made and we scored up a disappointing -100.
At the other table EW did not get too excited on their mis-fitting hands, and stopped in just 4H, making the same 11 tricks for -650 and 13 Imps away.
No EW pair made 12 tricks in the Seniors, even though South led the S8 on 2 occasions, making 12 tricks cold. 6NT went off twice.
6 HE was made twice in the Open, and once in the Womens, each time on the lead of the S8, although why any sane defender would lead a singleton against a slam holding 5 trumps baffles me!

On board 7 in the tenth match against SA I back-pedalled when Therese responded in my singleton and did not show the full value of my hand.
Although it is only 13 HCPs , I have a 5-loser hand, and if partner can dredge up even a minimum response, then I should jump to 4 H on my hand.
Having whimped out in rebidding just 2 H , I should then have come to life when Therese showed enough for game, but let the chance go by.
North led the D8 and when dummy tracked, I knew I had missed a Vulnerable slam, with the Grand slam depending on the finesse, so I won in hand and played the HA hoping to see the HK fall offside.
When nothing bad happened, we scored up +680 and since they bid the slam at the other table, we had dropped 13 Imps.
If I had entered dummy with a spade and took the heart finesse, at least I would have made 13 tricks and restricted the loss to 12 Imps.


On board 20 in the tenth match against SA I was in relaxed mood when the opponents bid and supported diamonds, as holding zero HCPs I did not expect to play much of a part in the play, let alone expect to be playing the hand in 2 S !
Therese had too good a hand to meekly pass out 2D, and thus doubled for penalties, which forced me to bid my 4-card spade suit, which is just as well as we did not have a club fit.
North led the D6, and dummy's DK was immediately rendered useless when South put in the DJ when I played low from dummy, winning the first trick.
South led a club and I led a small heart off the table, won by North, who led the DQ, settling that suit for the defence. I ruffed the next diamond and led 2 rounds of hearts, setting up the $4^{\text {th }}$ heart.
South led another club, and now it was time to play 2 rounds of spades, conceding 1 off for -100 , flat against +90 at the other table.

On board 13 in the twelfth match against TAS a part-score battle was settled in our favour. Part-score hands such as this can make a big difference in a close match.
Therese has a reasonable hand, but too many values outside her 2 long suits, so declined to compete any further when East bid 4D over 3H.
I led the H2 (we are now leading low from 3 small in a suit that has been supported), and Therese won the HQ and returned the HK, pinning the HJ in East's hand.
There was nowhere for East to get rid of his 2 club losers, and the contract finished 1 off for +100 .
At the other table Mike and John passed over 3H, and led a top diamond. While double-dummy EW can make 8 tricks in a heart contract, the contract went 2 off for another +200 , and 7 Imps to us.

On board 16 in the twelfth match against TAS I got the system wrong and we got lucky. However, if I had got the system right, we would have played in 6D, which is cold.
Over a 2NT opening 3S is minor suit Stayman, and I confused this with a 3S response to a 1NT opening which shows a shortage in spades (my correct response is 3D), so we stopped in 5C instead of getting to our fit and bidding 6D.
West did something I rarely do, he led a singleton unbid suit when he only had a singleton trump, and he got lucky when his partner gave him a ruff to hold the contract to 11 tricks.
Since I knew correct bidding would have got us to 6D, this looked like 10 Imps away, but you can never be certain.
At the other table they did get to slam, but to 6 C , not 6 D , and our West also led a diamond, taking the slam 1 off for 10 Imps to us.
