## 2015 National Seniors Teams by Richard Wallis

Therese and I had the weekend off, so we started the SWP Teams on Monday reasonably fresh, except for my sore back from a severe stumble on the tennis court, which made sitting for the 20 boards a little uncomfortable, and since we were a four-person team, I could not get treatment.
This year we teamed up with a local pair, Karen Creet and Sheila Bird, and thanks to their fine results we were in the mix for the quarter finals until the end. We started off with a big win, to jump to $1^{\text {st }}$ place, and then had 2 small losses followed by a modest win to get us back to $20^{\text {th }}$ place.
We continued to fluctuate, and started the last match in $6^{\text {th }}$ place, but a small loss dropped us to $11^{\text {th }}$, just out of the top 8. This was enough to qualify us for the Mixed Team Playoff, and thanks to Richard Brightling, who substituted for me on Friday morning while I was getting treatment for my back, we came away with a win.
It was good to play with Karen and Sheila, who finished third on the datums, so obviously were a big part of our moderate success.
After quarters on Friday and semis on Saturday, the final was on Sunday between Lazer (W. Lazer, P. Gumby, I. Robinson, A. Braithwaite, M. M ${ }^{\mathrm{c} M a n u s ~ a n d ~ M . ~ W a r e) ~ a n d ~ N e i l l ~(B . ~ N e i l l, ~ A . ~ D e ~ L i v e r a, ~ G . ~}$ Smolanko, K, Bagchi, Z. Nagy and D. Lilley), and Lazer triumphed by 55 Imps.


On board 4 in the first match I got complacent because Therese was a passed hand, and I only rebid 2 H after the negative double, whereas even 4 H would not have been wild with my 4 -loser hand.
Her jump to game should have at least sparked some interest, but I was tuned out.
When the heart finesse worked and everything else was friendly, 13 tricks were easy and we scored up +710 .
Not many pairs bid the slam, as the datum was only +830 , and they missed the slam at the other table, so it was a flat board.
If I had jumped to 4 H over the double, Therese could have shown her interest with a 4 S cue-bid, and then with all of the other suits under control I could have trotted out Keycard, settling for 6 H when I found that the HQ was missing.


On board 12 in the first match my 2C response was game forcing and could have had as few as 2 clubs, then my 3 S rebid showed exactly 3card heart support.
Therese bid 3S as a non-serious slam try, and with my good controls I was interested in slam, in spite of my poor trumps, so I cue-bid 4C, showing first or second round control.
Therese's 4D was also first or second round control, obviously a singleton, so I trotted out RKCB, with 4NT.
After the non-serious slam try, her 5C response had to be 3 Key Cards, not zero, so I asked for the HQ with 5D, and she showed the HQ and the CK with 6C, so I bid the slam.
East led the D5, and I am sure that Therese thought the grand slam depended on a club guess, until she led the top 2 hearts and found the heart loser.
Therese gave up a heart, and West was subjected to too many discards and Therese formed the opinion he had the CQ and duly finessed the right way and made 12 tricks for +1430 . At the other table NS played in 3NT for 10 tricks, so we gained 13 Imps.

On board 6 in the second match we got lucky when the bad trump break was well positioned.
My 4D rebid was a splinter with 4-card spade support, and my 5C response to RKCB showed 3 Key Cards, followed by 5H denying the SQ.
Therese settled for the small slam, and East led the HQ, which Therese won in hand, cashed the CK, and led a trump to dummy getting the unpleasant, but not fatal news.
Since the clubs very conveniently split $3-3$, Therese could run the clubs, forcing West to ruff, and the defence was restricted to just the SQ, for 12 tricks and +980 to us.
If the spades had been in the East hand, slam could still have been made due to our good 'pips', but it would have been more difficult.
At the other table NS stopped in game, and made only 11 tricks for 11 Imps to us. Only a few pairs bid the slam, since the datum was 640.


On board 17 in the second match I got a little lazy and we missed firstly a slam and second a good penalty!
I could have doubled 2D, and if Therese bid 2S, then bid 3NT, or I could have passed and waited for the almost certain take-out double and played in 2DX, for at least +800 .
However I took the easy way out, and bid a practical 3NT, expecting to have a double diamond stop.
West dutifully led the D9, and I won the DA and led back the DT, setting up the D8 as my $10^{\text {th }}$ trick. When East led back the S3, it was safe for me to take the club finesse through West, and I emerged with 12 tricks for +490 .
It is not clear if we would have reached 6H if I had doubled instead of blasting 3NT, but they did at the other table, and went off, so we gained 11 Imps!


On board 2 in the third match I had momentary misgivings about my weak opening bid when Therese made a forcing 2D bid over West's 1 S overcall, but could do no better than bid 2NT, since I did not have diamond support!
Some say that a suit worth bidding is worth leading, but others prefer leading a 4-card suit to a 5-card suit, especially if declarer is expecting the lead of the known 5 -card suit.
West led the H6 to 3NT, and I won on the table to finesse the CT, and when that forced the CA, I was home, thanks to the S9 on the table. West switched to the S2, but it was too late!
4 clubs, 3 hearts and 2 diamonds added up to 9 without any spade trick, so that was +600 .
At the other table Sheila and Karen found their heart fit, but 2 H was 1 too high, so -50, but 11 Imps .

On board 20 in the fourth match Therese could have bid 3S after my 1 S response, but chose the conservative single raise, and I had no aspirations above game.
If she did bid 3S, I would have cue-bid 4C, or bid a non-serious 3NT, and either way I believe we would have quickly identified the lack of a heart control and stopped out of slam.
In 4S, West did not lead a heart, and I discarded one on the third club to make 12 tricks for +680 . In fact, via the ruffing finesse in diamonds, I could have discarded all of my hearts for 13 tricks.
At the other table NS did get to slam, and Karen and Sheila made no mistake, cashing the top hearts for 1 off and +100 , to collect 13 Imps.
At least a some pairs must have bid and made slam, as the datum was +760 , and allowing for a few pairs to go off, a few more than that must have made.

On board 20 in the fifth match Therese opened with a weak 2S, and I was obviously going to bid game, but in what denomination?
Since I had tenaces to protect in both red suits, I chose to try 3NT, expecting to have at least 6 spades and something in the other suits to justify the vulnerable 2 S .
West led the D5, and when dummy tracked, I had 10 tricks in the bag unless the spades were 3-0, even then if it was West with Q54!
I cashed the top spades to confirm they were breaking, and ran the spades discarding 2 diamonds and 2 clubs, before cashing the clubs finishing in hand and exiting with a diamond towards dummy.
All West could do was cash his 2 Aces and I had 11 tricks for +660 .
At the other table for some reason NS did not get to game, making 10 tricks in 3 S for -170 and 10 Imps to us.

On board 8 in the sixth match I was very reluctant to bid 2NT with such a flimsy stopper, but it was teams after all! When dummy tracked the extra stopper and extra spade made it a great contract, but still defeatable with every card wrong.
I did not expect West to hold the hand he did and not support spades! Maybe he was put off by my negative double, showing 4 hearts? He still has 3 trumps, an Ace and a singleton!
West led the S5 and East had his first chance to defeat the contract! He had to rise with the SA and push back the H4, and West wins this to switch to a diamond, then the CK defeats the contract.
I won the return on the table and led the CA and CJ, expecting East to hold the CK, and now East led a heart, my HJ losing to the HQ. When West returned a spade instead of a diamond, I had time to set up my HT for the $9^{\text {th }}$ trick.
The same contract went 1 off at the other table for 10 Imps


On board 12 in the sixth match I thought that all my Christmases had come at once when East bid 2C showing both majors, and I doubled showing a desire (in my mind) for penalties.
West was between a rock and a hard place and bid his doubleton spade, but Therese was not on the same wavelength and rebid 3D instead of letting me double. After a spade lead and continuation, 2SX could likely be held to just 1 trick, okay versus a Grand Slam!
I could nor credit East with such a poor hand, so bid a simple 6NT over the 3D rebid, but realized that we had missed a clod grand slam when dummy tracked, and that East did in fact have a death wish!
13 tricks was easy with the marked finesse in hearts, and we scored up +1470 , a possible loss.
Looking at dummy, without the opposition bidding, 7NT relies on the heart finesse or the singleton HQ, but North at the other table tried another line and went 1 off, so we gained 17 Imps.

Board 18 in the seventh match was similar to a hand in an earlier match, in that the responder had enough for game and at least an 8card major fit, but 3NT is the safest contract, to protect the tenaces in the strong hand.
At our table the bidding was short and sweet, East opened with a weak 2 H , and West raised to game.
The play was equally quick in that I led my singleton D8, and we cashed the first 4 tricks for 1 off. The only problem is that we should have also taken a spade trick, for 2 off!
Under the new system of scoring, this hasty cash cost and Imp, and a fraction of a VP.
At the other table, Sheila bid 3NT instead of 4 H , and while this can be defeated, Sheila made 9 tricks after a diamond lead from North for +400 and 10 lmps .

On board 20 in the eighth match I opened 1C after 3 passes, and then West made a simple 1D overcall, over which Therese bid 1S, since she did not have both majors as required for a negative double.
My 4C rebid was a 4-card raise, with $18-19$ HCPs, although opposite a passed hand slam is not so likely, so I could have just bid 4S.
Therese took a dim view of her hand, since I might have only 2 small clubs and wasted diamond values, and did not take the opportunity to cue-bid 4D, either first or second round control, but signed off in the spade game.
Even if Therese did bid 4D, while I have an easy cue of 4 H , it is not clear that I would have got to slam opposite a passed hand, but I have good controls among my 19 HCPs, and this would have given me an interest in slam.
The board was flat, also played in game at the other table, but while I do not have the datum for the board, I am sure some were in slam.
