2015 Seniors Trials by Richard Wallis

The entry of 14 pairs for this year's Seniors Trials, played over just 2 weekends, reduced the length of matches to just 16 boards, and even then 64 boards were required to be played on the first day. The Womens Trials, played at the same time, only had 12 pairs, which allowed for 20-board matches, but this meant the schedules and the boards were different, a problem for the Director and the players.

Therese and I started well with a good win in the first match to jump to the lead, and continued in a similar vein over the remaining 12 matches, being effectively locked into the team for Fremantle with 2 matches to go. The action for the other 2 places was much more highly contested, with the result on the final match dropping 3rd back to 4th and out of the team. The final team was Wallis/Tully, Gough/Pemberton and Howard/Wood, with O'Dempsey/Moses as the reserve pair. After some discussion between the team, Terry O'Dempsey was asked to be non-playing captain, and he has subsequently been endorsed by the QBA.

Our worst result was -1.3 Imps (cross-Imped scoring) against Gough/Pemberton, and we won the other 12 matches. Not that we played well all of the time, but most of the time we were in sync, and we rode our luck and did not get any really bad results.
