## **2016 BBC Teams of Three** by Richard Wallis

The December Teams of Three were scheduled to be hosted by KBC again, but venue problems caused it to be transferred to BBC, which turned out to be advantageous, as the number of teams increased to 34.

These were subdivided into A grade (12 teams all above 105 MPs), B grade (12 teams all between 23 and 105 MPs), and C grade (10 teams, all below 23 MPs). The format was Swiss style of 6 matches each of 8 boards using a live draw, which generally allowed time for discussion between matches of the boards of interest.

In A grade there was a ding dong battle between teams 1, 2 & 3, with each of us winning against one and losing against the other, to all finish 5 0 1, but team 3 (Neville Francis, Anne Barry, Jenny Hay and Camille Henry) did the best in the other matches to win from team 2 (Andy Hung, Tilley Thillainathan, Colleen Sobey and Ross Curran) with my team (Lesleigh Egan, Lynne Henley and Sheila Wills) in third place.

In B grade team 2 (Byron Longford, David Edwards, Rita Fatseas and Hugh Robinson) came down from Toowoomba and swept all before them to win all 6 matches from team 11 (Richard Ward, Jennifer Finigan, Mary Simon and Bill Larcombe) with team 6 (Jim Evans Gary Gibbards, Debbie Gibbards and Peter Finney) in third place.

In C grade team 1 (Therese Tully, Susan Sharp, Andrew Sharp and Peter Allingham) were runaway winners, over a match in front of team 7 (Carolyn Woolley, Fenna Cooper, Sandra Aring and Ian Sobing), with team 2 (Normand Maclaurin, Heather Todd, John Todd and Clare Gleeson) in third place.

This is meant to be a fun day and also a learning experience, and generally I think this was the order of the day, with very few calls for the Director other than routine leads out of turn etc. As is the norm for any congress nowadays, BBC provided us with plenty to eat and drink throughout the day, culminating in a BBQ high tea during prize giving.

On board 4 in the first match Lesleigh had a number of options after I bid 1 S in response to her 1H opening bid, with her doubleton club, a raise to 2S would be in order, but she wisely chose to rebid 2D and see what I bid next.

My 2NT rebid showed a club stop, was invitational and denied 5 spades, so she passed, and West led the unbid suit, but made the unusual lead of the C9! If she was to accept, 3S on the way to 3NT offers 4S.

This looked promising to me until the CT won the first trick, so my club suit was not destined for even 4 tricks! Next I turned my attention to hearts, and led the H2 from the table at trick 2.

West won the HJ and switched to the D7, which I won with the DA on the table to clear the hearts, taking a total of 3 hearts, 3 clubs, 2 diamonds and 1 spade for 9 tricks and +150.

At the other table North did raise spades, but NS got too high, and 3S had no play, finishing 1 off for 6 Imps to us.

Even discounting the wasted SK, maybe with the extra club she had enough to go to 5C, but my hand alone should have a play for 11 tricks in clubs, so I should have raised to game.  West dutifully led the ST, which may have given East the wrong count is seaded but Foot respectively.

I lucked in when Lynne had 4-card support and raised, but swap her major suits around, and double may have worked out better.  EW found their club fit, but subsided when I rebid 3S, possibly worried that there may be 10 tricks available in spades, since the 2C raise is normally a 5-card suit, so West knew they had a 6-5 fit.  East led the CA and with diamonds 2-2 and the spade finesse working, I had no trouble making 10 tricks for +170.  At the other table, it was NS that gave up and allowed Lesleigh and Sheila to play in 3C, making 11 tricks on a heart guess, so another +150 and 8 lmps.  5C is 50%, but the best line is to cash the HA and finesse through North, as it can be repeated, but this will lead to only 10 tricks.

East led the S2, and when dummy tracked it was obvious that I had to make as many tricks as possible with my small trumps, as well as set up some diamond tricks.  EW lost their way so much that East ruffed the third round of clubs and later on I was able to ruff a club in dummy with the H3, eventually finishing up with 7 tricks for 1 down and -100.  Since I had not seen all the hands, this looked okay, but unfortunately EW cannot make anything above the 2-level, and -50 from the other table meant 4 Imps out.

Since the strong hand was concealed, I had no hesitation in raising to 3NT with my 8-count, and West led the H4.  Sheila won the HK at trick 2 and carefully negotiated the diamond suit for 3 tricks, took the spade finesse successfully, and finished with 11 tricks in all for +460.  At the other table NS must have been playing a 16-18 1NT opening bid, as this bid was passed out. Opposite a maximum of 18 HCPs in South's hand North is marginal for an invitation, with not even a 5-card suit to offer declarer, but this time an invitation would have been accepted and the game would have made.  That was-150 and 7 Imps.

Once Sheila showed a simple raise I decided that EW were likely to have a game on and that I would do my best to play the hand.  This could have been wrong on a number of fronts. My hearts and diamonds may be sitting over West, so that game does not make, or worse still, they may be worthless, with a slam on for EW.  To my surprize nobody doubled and when dummy tracked, I could see at least that I was right about 5S making, so I could not go wrong in 6H. East did not shift to a diamond at trick 2, so I was just 1 down when I cashed the HA and the HK appeared, for -50.
