## 2017 Qld Open Teams by Richard Wallis

The entries for this year's Open Teams held at Toowong Bridge Club were a little down at only 22, but it was a tough event to win nonetheless. The numbers were very disappointing for a State Title, especially since 9 of those teams were Zonal teams receiving a QBA subsidy.
Top seeds were Francis (Neville Francis, Magnus Moren, Tony Hutton and Malcolm Carter) and they swept all before them winning 7 of the 8 matches to win by almost a full match.
My team (Lindy Vincent, Richard Ward, Therese Tully and Richard Wallis), after a slow start were hot on their tails, inflicting their only defeat, but we could not sustain the pressure and had to settle for second place. Doran (Martin Doran, Lyn Carter, Jill Magee and Terry Strong) were third, beating us in the last match but just failing to overcome our lead.
As usual, TBC did a great job of looking after us with food and drinks over the two days, and Director Jan Peach gave us a trouble-free weekend, with very few calls to convene an Appeal's Committee.

On board 7 in the first match South had a potentially good hand, depending on a fit, but a poor suit and an absence of Aces was a negative.
The hand improved for South when North responded 2D, but she showed her extra spade and a minimum hand to see where the hand was headed.
When North rebid diamonds it was obvious he was minimum but had at most 1 spade, thus the meagre South hand became a 3-loser, so she jumped to 5D!
I led a trump, but the sight of dummy was very daunting to me and 12 tricks were easily taken for -620.
This was a complete disaster for us as only 4 NS pairs got to 5D, and 9 others played in spades, 1 in 3NT and 1 EW made 3 H . The datum average was only 120 , so we lost 11 Imps against the datums and 10 in the match when Richard and Lindy reasonably stopped in 3D.


On board 15 in the second match I bid a lazy 3NT when Therese opened 1NT (15-17) instead of investigating a club slam if there is a good fit.
North led the HJ and when Therese saw the dummy she could see that a good slam had been missed. Assuming the clubs behaved there were 12 top tricks, with a possible squeeze for 13 , so she rose with the HA and cashed the CK.
The 3-0 club split put paid to 12 tricks and we had a lucky escape, making just 11 tricks for +460 and a flat board.
Systemically I should have responded to 1NT with 2S, as a transfer to clubs, and Therese would have rebid 2NT, a super-accept.
Now I could have set clubs with 4C, and cue-bidding would get us to 6 C . However, if my hand is declarer, 6C could make except on a spade lead and continuation via a major suit squeeze.

On board 19 in the second match South missed a golden opportunity when they bid 1H over my 1D overcall instead of making a negative double!

North had an uncertain diamond stopper, so rebid 2H instead of 1NT (or 1S). Surprizing to me when I saw the whole hand, South did not even make a game try, simply passing 2 H , to which Therese led the D5 and we cashed our 2 tricks and led another diamond.
Declarer has 3 certain losers in any contract, and in 2H must also lose a trump, so 9 tricks was the limit, for -140.
At the other table Lindy did make a negative double, and Richard ended in 4 S as North, which has no problem when the spades are 3-2 and the C9 comes good with one ruff.
It is also likely that the DJ came good so that was +420 and 7 Imps to us.

On board 11 in the third match I was surprized by all the bidding at my first turn to bid, so showed my suit and values suggesting maybe 3NT or 4 S if Therese had a suitable hand, but when 4 H came around to me a penalty double seemed obvious.
Therese led the CT and the sight of dummy was a surprize to all, especially 6 clubs and only 2 hearts. When declarer played low in dummy I played the CQ, ruffed by declarer. Now declarer led the DA and another and I won, and led the H5, ducked to dummy.
Declarer led a club off dummy, ruffed and Therese over-ruffed, and then exited with a spade to my Ace. We cashed 3 more tricks for 3 off and +500 , although after winning with the H 8 it could have been 4 off except for a bit of confusion as to South's strength.
At the other table East or West overbid and finished in 4S, undoubled, which finished 2 down for another +100 and 12 Imps.

Board 13 in the third match was a triumph for our system, although at the time it seemed like another flat board. My 2NT showed 18-19 HCPs and the 3S rebid by Therese was forcing and set spades as trumps, with some slam implications.
After 3S I could/should have bid 4C as a cue-bid, but wimped out and signed off in 4 S . Therese was not finished yet and used RKCB and found there was 1 Key Card missing. Holding 7 spades, Kx or Kxx may be enough for slam, but to be sure she next asked for the SQ with 5D.
My 6H rebid showed the SQ and the HK, so 6 S became the final contract. A grand slam is possible opposite QJ or QJx, but a grand slam on a finesse is not good teams play. North led the HQ and fairly quickly Therese claimed 13 tricks for +1460 .
The 7-card spade suit opposite the 2NT rebid (surely guaranteeing at least 2 spades), would seem to suggest that spades should be the final denomination, which also protects the DK. However East finished in 3NT at the other table, and after the lead of the DQ was lucky to make 10 tricks but 13 Imps to us.

On board 20 in the fourth match Therese opened 2NT, showing a balanced 20-21, and my 3D was a transfer to hearts.
Holding a reasonable hand and exactly 3 hearts, Therese rebid 3S, and I was away to slam with 4NT.
I could have forced Therese to bid Hearts first with 4D, but wanted to protect my spade holding, so made my hand declarer.
The 5C response confirmed that we had all of the Key cards, but a grand slam was not considered as that constituted 15 HCPs out of a maximum of 21, and probably not another long suit as a source of tricks.
South led the S8 and when dummy tracked there was no need to protect my spade holding, and 12 tricks on top even with a 5-0 heart break, so that was +1430 .
At the other table they could not identify the heart fit early and subsided in 4H, so we gained 13 Imps.


On board 22 in the fourth match Therese transferred to hearts as a first step when I opened 1NT, but as my hand did not allow a superaccept, or a jump to 3 H to show a minimum with 4-card support, she settled for the obvious 6NT and South led the ST.
North covered the SJ and then I needed a heart break or a squeeze for 12 tricks, and I could relax when the hearts broke 3-2 and consider a possible squeeze for 13.
When I cashed the hearts pitching 2 clubs North had to release two spades and South a spade, diamond and club. Then I cashed the SK forcing South to discard another club and then I ran the top diamonds.
So now North is in sole charge of the black suits and when he chose to discard the C2, I had the $13^{\text {th }}$ trick in dummy with the C6.
Obviously I would not like to bid a grand slam and then rely on a double squeeze, but it was a nice way to gain 1 Imp.

On board 5 in the fifth match NS were caught in a systemic black spot where South wanted to investigate a 5-3 spade fit, but there was no clear way so he settled for 3NT and hoped for the best.
Declarer showed at least 4 clubs in the bidding, so it was a red-suit lead for me and I chose the HQ as I had touching honours.
This hit the jackpot and as I had 2 entries, in spite of the diamond finesse working, North had to settle for 8 tricks and +100 to us.
Declarer won the HK and finessed the SQ and I gave thought to leading the DK to kill dummies diamonds, but rejected that as declarer could duck.
Instead I continued hearts (Therese had encouraged) and declarer unblocked the spades and led the DK, which I covered.
At the other table Lindy was able to identify the $5-3$ spade suit and the final contract was 4SS, making 10 tricks for +620 and 12 Imps.

On board 9 in the fifth match NS were play all Multi-Twos, thus 2C was among other things, either a weak 2D or a strong 2C, and South bid 2D as a possible waiting bid.
Holding both majors I doubled firstly, intending to convert a 3C response to $3 S$ (equal-level conversion), but when 2 D came around to me Therese is bound to have some values, so I bid 2 S over which Therese invited game and I accepted.
South led the D9 and I won on the table perforce! Anxious to discard a heart on the DA I came to hand with a trump and discarded the H4 then led to the H8, won by North, who returned a trump.
North showed out on the next heart, and it was easy to make 10 tricks for +620 , losing 2 hearts and a club.
At the other table a normal 2D opening led to Richard and Lindy sacrificing in 5D, which has 5 top losers and thus finished 3 off for 500 , but 3 Imps to us.

On board 17 in the sixth match against the eventual winners, Therese demonstrated that the old stand-by of $4^{\text {th }}$ highest of your longest and strongest is still effective.
After North showed his hearts, South jumped to 3NT, hoping his T754 in diamonds would be a stopper. If North had Jx in diamonds an x in clubs he would have been right, but when Therese led the D8 and my DQ won the first trick, we very quickly had 5 tricks after which declarer was able to claim the rest.
North gave thought to bidding 4H over South's 3NT, but passed, albeit reluctantly.
At the other table Richard rebid his hearts and 4 H became the final contract. An unlikely spade lead would have removed an entry to the North hand prematurely, but this did not happen and he finished with 12 tricks for +480 and 11 Imps.

Even if North had bid just 2 S on board 19 in the sixth match I had nowhere to go without support, but when Therese doubled 3S I had an easy 4D, although South's quick double was a little unsettling.
Therese pulled the double to 4 H and North came to light with a double, as many would, and led the S3.
Therese ruffed the second spade and led the HA, getting the bad news and a good contract had just got harder.
Therese cashed the top diamonds and clubs, and ruffed another spade for her $9^{\text {th }}$ trick, counting the top hearts, which set up the endplay on North.
When Therese exited with a club (North discarding his last spade) and South returned a diamond, she ruffed with the HA and led the CT forcing North, with only trumps left to ruff and lead a trump into her tenace.
That was +790 and 5 Imps to us as the 4 H contract at the other table was not doubled.


Board 7 in the seventh match looked pretty normal at the time when I made a simple raise of Therese's 1 S overcall, but there were misgivings.
I had bad shape, suspect values in hearts, and North showed spade values with his 1 NT response, but if I failed to raise to 2 S, everything would be usefull and $2 S$ would roll in with an overtrick!
Alas all my concerns were real, and a second heart lead from North, using a minor suit Ace as an entry killed off the hearts, and there were still 2 clubs, 2 spades and 1 diamond to lose, which was only 5 tricks and 3 off for - 300 .
This seemed like a disaster at the time, but score-up was a different story as the same contract was reached at the other table. I do not have the details, but this time it went 4 off for +400 and thus we gained 3 Imps after all.

Board 21 in the eighth match was a misfit all around, and whomever stopped first had the last laugh. I had a minimum opening bid including a stiff King, but 2 suits and an easy rebid, so I opened 1H.
Therese's 2C response over South's 1S overcall was forcing for 1 round, but not to game, and when the misfit was obvious, stop as soon as possible was the recommendation, so she gave me preference to my first-bid suit.
I was a little surprized when the red suits were placed on the table, but glad that clubs were not bid again, and also that I had 6 hearts, ably reinforced by the HA.
South led the H7, and I had time to set up the diamonds for 3 tricks, plus 4 hearts and the CA, so that was 8 in all for +110 .
It does not look like the type of hand anyone would get to game on, but that is what happened at the other table when East played in 4H, also making 8 tricks for 2 off and -100 , so we gained 5 Imps.
