## 2019 Gold Coast Open Teams by Richard Wallis

The $58^{\text {th }}$ Gold Coast Congress has come and gone and this is the first one without my good friend and long-time partner Tony Jackman. In his honour, and with 5 of last year's team still present, Meta Goodman, Wynne Webber, Therese Tully, Tim Runting and myself, we called the team Jackman as usual. We asked Craig Francis to fill the vacant spot, and we must have done something right, as with 8 wins out of 12 and a maximum win on the final match we finished $24^{\text {th }}$, our best result for some time.
Meta, Wynne and Therese played as a threesome at our home table, and Craig, Tim and myself played as a threesome at the away table, although Tim's Convener duties limited when he could play. Our second-worst result was against the Fischer team (13) in Match 8 , where we lost by 22 imps , and this team finished $2^{\text {nd }}$ in the Swiss, making the final series but losing in the semi-final. We had a 2 Imp win against team 9 in Match 10 and then our biggest loss to team 22 in Match 11, 25 imps , pushed us back to $55^{\text {th }}$ place, before we sailed home to $24^{\text {th }}$ place.
The winners of the Teams Final included Andy Hung, now residing in WA but a Queenslander at heart. He played in the Coutts team of James Coutts, Shane Harrison, Nabil Edgtton, Ellena Moscovsky, Liam Milne and Andy Hung. Liam and Andy also combined playing with co-editing the daily Bulletin. Well done to all of the team.

On Board 21 in the second match I made a weak jump overcall of 2D and found Craig with a good hand and diamond support. He had a hard decision but went for the maximum result, hoping I had at least the DA.
After North led the C4 his optimism was rewarded when I had probably the best hand for him from the bidding and he had free choice to guess a possible 3-0 diamond split, and absolutely no problem if diamonds were 2-1.
When diamonds behaved he had 9 tricks, but no real possibility for a $10^{\text {th }}$ as North had 4 clubs to cash if she won the HA.

This was +400 to go with -200 at the other table where Wynne had to soldier on in 2 H when it is EW that can make 7 tricks in hearts.
3NT is the only making game for EW unless they can contrive for West to be declarer in 5D as a club lead beats 5D by East.

On Board 17 in the fourth match I had minimal points but great shape so I had no hesitation in jumping to game after Craig gave me support.
South led the H10 and dummy's hearts were a big surprise, especially when North produced the HA and was known from the lead to have the HJ as well!
It seemed to me that if South overcalled with such poor hearts he is more likely to hold the SK, so I played the SA and was duly rewarded.
A club towards dummy forced South to play the CA and CQ. I took a diamond pitch before taking the trump finesse and then played DA and D6. NS had no defence.
If South wins I can ruff a diamond in dummy while if North overtakes to play a trump, my D10 becomes good.
At the other table the same contract was played to the same opening lead but declarer went 1 off for +50 and 10 imps to us.


On Board 20 in the fourth match Craig's double of the 2 H overcall showed 3-card spade support, which did not interest me although Deep Finesse suggests that 4 S is makeable.
I showed my club suit next, at least 5 since Craig might only have 2 for his opening bid, and I was not prepared to let NS play in 4 H , although when I saw the hands it was obvious that we had 4 tricks.
North led the H4 to 5C and Craig was at a crucial point in the hand. No matter where the hearts are, the contract is likely to depend upon the spade finesse as a diamond must be lost, so there are 2 lines of play:

1. Discard a diamond on the H 4 and another when you get in on the established HK then lead trumps hoping the spade finesse is right.
2. Ruff the H 4 , but not with the C 5 as this card may be needed to re-enter your hand later if the clubs are 3-0.
Both lines work but alas Craig ruffed instinctively with the C5 at trick 1 and then played the CK so was not able to take all of the options and -100 was 6 imps out against -130 at the other table.

On Board 16 in the sixth match South was able to double with such a weak hand to show the other 2 suits. Many people would use 1NT or 2NT to show the other suits with such a weak hand and leave the double to be a little stronger, but to each his/her own.
Craig's redouble showed 3-card support and North made a weak jump of her own to take up room. But all I needed was 3-card support, so I jumped to game.
South was excited by North's jump response, and at favourable vulnerability, she elected to sacrifice in 5C, which turned out to be right on this hand!
I led the HA and we quickly cashed out for 3 off and +500 . It was lucky for us that South only had 1 diamond, as otherwise we had missed a slam.
At the other table Therese and Meta were not so brave (reckless?) and East made 11 tricks in 4 H for 4 imps out.

On Board 10 in the seventh match, after I opened with a 15-17 1NT we had a simple transfer auction to 4 H , and South led a top-of-nothing S6.
I wanted to encourage North to continue the suit, and at the same time, unblock, so I played the SK at trick 1. North won and returned the S7, which I won in hand to run the H 9 which won!
Another heart, also ducked, and I now had 10 tricks without the diamond finesse as the D5 can be discarded on the third spade, which was lucky as the DK was wrong.
There is nothing that South could have done, as, even if I had played the HA at trick 3 it looks like only 2 hearts will be lost and that is what happened even though the heart finesse worked at trick 3!
At the other table the bidding was the same, but this time South led the C7 (MUD) and somehow or other (probably brilliant defence by Wynne and Meta) the contract went 1 off so we gained 12 imps.

On Board 1 in the ninth match NS were playing Precision, so 2C was natural and 2D was an enquiry, with 3S natural and 14-15 HCPs.
I developed an aversion to leading away from an unsupported Jack many years ago, but this is one of the few times that I have seen it successful.
Craig led the D2, which I encouraged as declarer won on the table and then led the S5, covering my S10 with the SJ. Craig won the SA and led the DJ and another, declarer ruffing.
Declarer then led the S4 towards dummy and, on winning the SK, my DK promoted the S 7 into another winner for Craig whilst at the same time taking declarer's last trump. Thus we gained 2 heart tricks to go with the 5 others, for 3 off and +150 .
At the other table the invitation for the spade game was refused, and 3S by South became the final contract, to which West led the S3. This did not test Meta's declarer play and 11 tricks were +200 and 8 imps .

What I did not want was to take a losing club finesse at trick 1 and allow North to lead back a club for South to ruff. <br> If North ruffed the CA I could still take the now marked club finesse after drawing trumps. Consequently I only made 12 tricks, versus -510 at the other table, but 10 imps . |

On Board 13 in the eleventh match Tim went quietly after South opened 1 H , preferring to overcall 2 C , and North wisely passed.
I did not know whose hand it was, but I was surprised by no heart support from North, so I jumped to the most practical game of 5C. North led the H2.

Since the H2 suggested an honour, South played the HK at trick 1 and Tim was able to pitch spades from the table to assure 12 tricks when the clubs were 2-1 and his 3 major suit losers were ruffed in dummy.
South ducked the D3 when it was led off the table, so Tim scored up 13 tricks for +640 .
At the other table West passed Wynne's 1 H opening and when Therese passed and East balanced with a double, he also passed the double!
Wynne made 5 tricks for 2 off and -500 , so we gained 4 imps . This also accords with Deep Finesse's analysis which suggests the EW can make 8 tricks with hearts as trumps.

On Board 26 in the twelfth match Craig opened with a 20-22 2NT and I enquired about the majors, to which he denied a 5 -card major but had at least one 4-card major.
I showed a 4-card spade suit and at the same time denied 4 hearts, so Craig jumped to 4S. North led the DK.
Craig allowed the DK to win, and North, probably misreading South's signal on the DK, erred by next leading the C5, picking up the suit for no losers.
Now a diamond ruff and successful spade finesse allowed Craig to park his heart loser on the $4^{\text {th }}$ club while North ruffed with his trump trick, for +650.
Deep Finesse suggests that EW can be held to 9 tricks in a spade contract, but it is a lot easier when you can see all the hands.
West at the other table opened 1C and played there. After the lead of the C5 she made 10 tricks for -130 and 11 imps to us.

On Board 27 in the twelfth match, which was almost the last of the event, South's opening bid of 1 C was passed around to me and I went straight to game by jumping to 4S.
South's double quickly caught my attention, and South led the HA, DK and DA, which I ruffed and led the S3 towards dummy.
South jumped up with the SK and erred by next leading the HQ to dummy, allowing me to ruff a diamond and use the SJ to enter dummy again to cash the now good diamonds for 10 tricks and +590 .
If South leads a club at any time I am liable to mis-guess, putting on dummy's CQ, but he did not put me to the test.
Also a spade back at trick 5 give me the entry is too early to take full advantage. So I should have been 1 off.
At the other table Therese responded 1H to the 1C opening, as would I, and finished too high for -150 and 11 imps.
