This year our normal 5-person team was disrupted by Wynne Webber having to pull out due to family issues, so we were down to only 4, and since Therese Tully is too busy with convening to play every match, we had to augment.

Accordingly we had to add 2 new members to our team, and John Craig and Anne Lamport agreed to join Tony Jackman, Meta Goodman, Therese Tully and myself. We started out well, but a maximum loss against team 2 in the second match put us in our place and we never recovered, finishing with 6 wins, 1 draw and 5 losses for 16th place out of 34 teams.

The 12th match was my biggest disappointment, as on paper it should have been a win to move us up the ladder, although not close enough for the finals, but a smallish loss moved us further down.

The 2D rebid was ostensibly a 4-card suit, and showed extras, so I raised initially since I did not want to suggest spade tolerance by bidding 2NT. However, when John bid the 4 th suit I was able to bid 3NT confident we had reached the final contract. Even though, as a passed hand my 2C was not forcing and therefore showed at least a 5-card suit, North led the CJ, which I was surprized to win in hand as South showed out.

The heart finesse was now safe, and even though it lost I had 9 tricks in 2 spades, hearts and clubs, to go with 3 diamonds for +400. This looked like a flat board as a spade lead is unlikely, but at the other table even after the same lead 3NT went 1 off for +10 Imps

After the 2NT rebid, I did not find out why North bid 3H instead of 4H immediately, but it may have been to suggest slam potential. Anne led the SQ and when dummy tracked our prospects did not look good, and so they proved. North won the SA and immediately played 2 rounds of trumps. We eventually won 2 trumps and a club for -620. At the other table the contract was 3NT played by South, and West led

The dummy was a big bonus for me as it looked like 4H was cold, even 5H was makeable if East had the CK. After the lead of the DA and HA, I ruffed the second heart and led the SK won by East, who led another heart. East kindly discarded a club on the second spade, which confirmed that 4H was making, and made it more likely that I could bring the clubs in for 3 tricks, and so it proved, finishing 2 off for -300. At the other table Therese and Anne competed to 5H, which makes,

Therese's 2S response unfortunately would have put my hand on the table, but showed a positive response with a good 5-card heart suit. South overcalled 2NT to show the minors, and then there was no

South's normal lead was the D3, which gives 3NT no chance. Over the 1S overcall, John's double was negative showing 4 hearts, and when I cuebid 2S, John dutifully bid 2NT, which I raised to game. On the expected spade lead from South, John wrapped up an easy 9 tricks for +600. If North had overcalled a suit he wanted led, such as diamonds, we would likely have stayed out of Notrump, and our best fit is clubs, for

North got in the auction with a weak 3C and South passed, allowing me to easily show my other suit, which John raised to game. North led the C3 and I won perforce, and went across to dummy with the SA to lead a heart, feeling a lot better when South produced the HK. Now a second heart to dummy and a spade off the table and there was nothing South could do to prevent 11 tricks. A club back now would enable me to pitch all of dummy's diamonds and rack up 12 tricks, but North asked for a diamond which South duly obliged, so it was +650. At the other table EW did not compete over 5C and this contract only went 1 off for -100 and 11 Imps.

North certainly got good value out of his modest hand, but 4S is a reasonable contract. A club lead would have been inspired, but when North ruffed the 3 rd heart and led a spade to hand, the appearance of the top 2 spades gave me a certain trump tricks anyway, so 4S was doomed. At the other table I assume that West neither opened nor overcalled hearts, as the final contract was 1NT by Tony, and East led the D3. 3NT still has no real chance, but 5 rounds of clubs and 5 discards were too much for West to survive, and the final tally was 10 tricks for +430. So that was 10 Imps to us in a match that was mostly the other way, losing it 20-0.

I was off to a good start when North led the D3 and South produced the DJ, giving me another potential entry to hand. While we play a natural weak two, it is a constructive bid, showing 9- 11 HCPs and a good suit, so the 2S opening from John was encouraging, since I had an opening hand and a 7-card suit. However, when dummy tracked, the singleton club was a disappointment, as my chances for 9 tricks were greatly reduced. Basically I needed South to hold the CJ doubleton or trebleton, or less likely North to have the CJ doubleton. so I led a club off the table

John rebid his good 6-card spade suit over 2C, although in my view, it is imperative to mention the heart suit first. South bid 3C, and if ever I was going to bid my heart suit this was the time, but I wilted and 3C became the final contract. John led the top spades and then a third spade forcing North to ruff with the CJ. When John won the CA, another spade allowed me to over-ruff dummy, but that was 9 tricks for -110. At the other table EW did find their heart fit, and South did not find the diamond lead, resulting in 12 tricks for -680, which amounted to -790 in total and 13 Imps away.

Of course South led the H2 and North was easily able to recognize this as a singleton, and rather than setting up dummy's suit, made the mistake of returning a small heart for South to ruff. However this swapped the HK for the D7, and instead of the defence getting both 2 hearts and 2 diamonds, they only got 1 heart and 2 diamonds. When North won the CA and led another heart, Therese could ruff high, and lead a trump to dummy, eventually forcing out the DA for 9 tricks and +670.

Of course as I confirmed later in our system notes, any jump response to game is always to play, so I should have passed 4S, and be thankful of having 2-card support, since my hand is pretty weak otherwise. South was remarkedly silent considering his long diamond suit, probably because of his good hearts, but NS can in fact make 5D, by
