2012 Seniors Last Train at the NOT by Richard Wallis

This year was my first visit to the NOT since 1997, and only my 4th overall, but in contrast to the other times, I was there for the whole 2 weeks, the first event of which was the Seniors Last Train.

I was playing with John Brockwell, and we had a shaky start, losing our first 2 matches to be near the tail of the field of 22 Pairs, before storming back with 3 maximum wins to hit the lead with just 3 matches to go.

Our 6th match was a 14-16 loss to the eventual winners, Richard Brightling and Kathy Boardman which still kept us in a close second, but our final 2 matches were not much better, being a 16-14 win and a 15-15 draw, but luckily there were no bolters, and we stayed in second position to the end.

This was a very enjoyable event and I hope to play again in it next year when we can try to improve just a little.

I did not look up the scores from other tables, but I expected a few duplications of our result, and was pleasantly surprised when we got an 11 lmp pick-up. East led the C2, and since it was likely that West had the DA and I would not be able to discard my 3 hearts, I led to the HQ at trick 2 and was pleasantly surprised to see it win. A greater surprise followed, when the spade finesse worked at trick 3

On board 20 in match 2 it worked when John raised pre-emptively over North's Michaels Cue-bid, and I went with the flow and continued on to game. North led the CA, and luckily did not find the diamond switch that would have allowed South to give him a club ruff to defeat the contract, instead switching to a heart. A diamond switch may give up a trick unnecessarily, but after the lead of the CA, it should have been automatic at teams scoring.

When I picked up my hand even 6D looked possible, but this was dampened somewhat when John opened with a weak two in spades. Nonetheless 5D is still a chance, so that is what I bid, expecting to go close to making it, and on the actual hand only 2 rounds of trumps put it off, and leading the SA will allow an overtrick. When East ventured 5H, the favourable vulnerability would not let me take the chance that he had got it right, so I bid 1 more for the road. Now West woke up to his diamond void and bid his one more for the

My 2S bid showed at least a limit raise in diamonds, which is all I am likely to have being a passed hand. John has a difficult hand to evaluate, but accepted my willingness to go to the 4-level as encouragement and bid the cold game, complicated only slightly by the 3-0 trump break.

Another spade came back from West, but dummy's trumps were too high for East and the HQ provided a discard for the C4. John was able to ruff his 3 spades and take the club finesse for an overtrick, but had to settle for +600 when it lost. This was worth 10 Imps, when other tables either stayed out of game or tried 3NT which has only 8 tricks.

I thought his 4NT was a good hand, possibly asking for Aces, but he was responding to 4C as Minorwood, as we had agreed that after a minor had been bid naturally by either partner, 4 of the minor was always Minorwood, but I had forgotten. Despite the bad fit and no support from partner, South rebid their 7- card suit and there the matter rested, with the lead in my court. This looked like the time to have a look at dummy if possible before

This looked like the time to have a look at dummy if possible before deciding on the next play, so I led the CK, and even though this held, prospects did not look good when dummy had 3 trumps and a singleton club.

Low and behold, John had 2 certain trump tricks, so we took 3 tricks for +50 and 6 Imps, the biggest swing of the match, a match that we won 40-0 for 25 VPs, our second in a row.

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I did not think it was politic to ask the systemic meaning of the 2S response on board 5 in match 5, but whatever it was it appears to have been wrongly applied.

We have 4 tricks in the normal 4H contract, but the field was making +620, so EW must have been contriving to throw one of them away, and in 4S I make the potentially costly lead of the CQ!

South took the heart finesse and pitched a diamond, so he was off to a good start after my lead gave away our club trick, declarer now just having 3 losers, 2 spades and a diamond, but he continued by ruffing a heart on which John pitched a club, and whenever we got the lead we forced him again with diamonds, so he lost control.

Towards the end game he was a little rattled and forgot about my lead so we made a club trick after all, and 4S finished 3 off for +300 and 13 Imps.

On board 15 in match 5 NS were playing a strong 1NT, and thus were able to right-side the hand by transferring with the North hand and making South the declarer in 4S.

The bidding after that is a bid wonky, even to John passing 5C when I had shown hearts, expecting a 5-card club suit in my hand, but NS let us off the hook.

4S is defeated by a diamond ruff followed by a club return before the HA is knocked out, but that was too hard to find from my hand, and I led the H4, which allows South to make 5S unless a diamond comes back immediately, but John, with 4 trumps, led back a club.

Declarer won the CA, pitched the losing club on the HK, and then led out the trumps, probably expecting to have 2 diamond losers and being 1 off.

However, while the favourable diamond position allows my DT to be picked up, there is no way for declarer to get back to hand after drawing all of the trumps, so 5S finished 1 light after all, for +100 and 12 lmps.

West's double was for penalties, and I meant my redouble as showing the balance of power, but that was not we had agreed to play. The systemic meaning was thrown out the window when Kathy bid 2S, and when this came around to me I bid the 'obvious' 3NT, as must have many others as the board average was only +30 to NS. Richard unkindly led the DK, getting count from Kathy, and proceed to cash the first 6 tricks for 2 off and -200, 6 Imps away. It is hard for us to stop in a part-score after the 1NT opening, but that is all we can make, 3H or 4C, but wait there is another contract we can make, - 1S! If I had been playing the system as we agreed, I would have passed the double to allow John to redouble, but Kathy would still have bid 2S, and now I can double 2S for +300.

To make matters worse I did not lead hearts, and when John tried to cash 2 diamonds, declarer entered dummy with a trump and ruffed another diamond before exiting with a heart to force us to open up the club suit. Lucky for us, and under his partner's scorn, he got it wrong so was 1 off. At the least I should have doubled to show some values, but that would be scant reward, being +200 instead of +100, and only saving 2 Imps. It is hard to get to 6D, but even 5D would be 7 Imps Since I have 3 diamonds and a void spade, I could have risked a 4NT bid to show the other 2 suits, but I was concerned that John would take this as RKCB. John on the other hand, even with only 16 KCPs has a relatively safe haven in 5D, rather than take the risk that 4S will make.

We had agreed to open 4-card suits up the line, so my 1D opening showed at least a 4-card suit, and we had also agreed that any raise to 4 of a minor was to be treated an Minorwood, so I showed 2 key cards and the DQ. His next bid asked for outside Kings, and I showed 1, so John could count 13 tricks. In retrospect, since he could count 13 top tricks, he should have bid 7NT, since there may be a ruff by the opponents in a diamond contract, but all was well. North led the DJ as before he put dummy down John proclaimed 13 tricks, and as soon as the dummy went down I claimed. It was surprizing that the board average was only -890, even less than the small slam.

Since I had some values and 3 trumps, I gave John a raise, but believed I had made the wrong decision when John immediately raised to game and Bobby doubled. It looks like 2 rounds of trumps will defeat 4H, but DF has it making 10 tricks, so there must be a squeeze or throw-in. John was not tested by the defence as George led the top diamonds and then a club at trick 3, and he was able to ruff the spades in dummy and clubs back to hand, just conceding a trick to the HA after this had been carried out. Surprizingly game must have been bid at most of the tables as -620 was the board average, so +790 was only worth 5 lmps.
