WELCOME TO THE 56TH GOLD COAST CONGRESS

As Confucius suggested 'may we live in interesting times' and 2016 and early 2017 are certainly 'interesting times'.

The world continues to be plagued by violence ranging from attacks in nightclubs to trucks and cars driving into crowds of people. Putting oneself in harm's way should of course be avoided but I adopt the attitude that if incidents such as these make me change my life plans then those on the other side win and I lose. This being the case, and that being my excuse, 2016 was one of the busiest travel years of my life with much of the focus being on bridge. Canberra, Gold Coast, World Youth Championships in Salsomaggiore in Italy and the World Championships in Poland being the highlights.

During one of the tournaments I reflected on how much I owed to the game of bridge as a result of it taking me to the most amazing places in the world and for one or two weeks at a time not simply a day here and a day there. Places such as Santiago, Yokohama, Lille, Monte Carlo, Estoril, Istanbul, Chennai, Sanya, Wroclaw, Opatija, Shanghai, Beijing, Hong Kong, Jakarta, Bali, Biarritz, Tenerife, Menton, Philadelphia, San Diego, San Remo and many more I can't even remember. It is partly why I have committed to seeing the promotion of Youth Bridge as the future of the game. As a sidenote I urge all players to do what they can to welcome and make youth players feel comfortable playing the game that we all love.

Leicester City winning the English Premier League Football as a 5000/1 chance, England voting to 'Brexit' and Donald Trump becoming the 45th President of the USA certainly added to the level of interest in 2016, but the bridge world did not escape its share of controversy with three of the high profile pairs accused of cheating being found guilty while a fourth pair, from Poland have seemingly slid into the rear vision mirror.

But, in bridge, if it isn't one controversy it's another. A day after the completion of the World Open Pairs Championship, it came to light that there was a scoring error in both the Open and Women's Pairs. Although it was well past the score correction time there were organisational shortcomings which resulted in the WBF reviewing what took place and subsequently awarding Joint Gold Medals to Ashley Bach and Michael Cornell (New Zealand) together with Auken/Welland (Germany). An almost identical situation occurred in the Women's Pairs which saw Pipilov-Sver (Croatia) being promoted to joint winners with Levi-Asulin (Israel). A detailed account appears in a later bulletin.

Anyway it's now all about our beloved Gold Coast Congress. Here are the changes to the program in 2017:

- Friday evening no-frills not scheduled due to the GCCEC not being available to us at that time.
- 0-500 Masterpoint Sections within Weekend Swiss and Monday Butler
- Walk-In Events slightly changed
- Theme afternoon "Stars and Stripes"
- Weekend Swiss 9 board matches
- Friday events restructured

All that leaves me to say is for you to sit back and relax, respect and be kind to your partners, opponents and officials and enjoy a relaxing eight days of bridge in which is, in my opinion, the best tournament in the world.

Entries for the end-of-week events (Ivy Dahler Butler Pairs, Seres-McMahon Matchpoint Swiss Pairs and Friday Novice Pairs) close at Noon Thursday 23rd February.

To relieve the pressure on the Administration Desk at this time and to cut down on the queues, we are leaving the web site on-line entries open right up until Noon Thursday 23rd February for players wishing to enter and pay on-line by credit card.

You will still be able to pay at the Administration Desk using cash, cheque or credit card. Changes to existing entries (different players, changing events, cancellations etc.) will need to be done at the Administration Desk however any changes will incur a \$10.00 administrative fee except for Open Teams Members placed in the top ten teams after round 11 of the qualifying.

So, avoid the queues, and enter online using your iPad, notebook or smartphone.

YOUTH, STUDENT & OTHER CONCESSIONAL ENTRY FEES-ADVISE WHEN ENTERING

- Courtesy of the Gold Coast Congress, all players born on or after 1st January 1997 are entitled to free entry.
- In accordance with Australian Bridge Federation policy, all players born between 1st January 1992 and 31st December 1996 inclusive are entitled to a 50% discount on entry fees.
- Courtesy of the Gold Coast Congress, all players born BEFORE 1st January 1917 are entitled to free entry.

PARKING

Parking will be available for \$10 per entry per day or \$50 for a weekly pass with unlimited entry from Saturday 18th February to Saturday 25th February inclusive.

The Bridge Administration Desk is the ONLY place you can obtain a weekly pass. It will be open on Saturday 18th February from 10:00am to 11.00pm (and from 9.00am on other days). Weekly passes can only be used from Saturday to Saturday inclusive.

For those requiring casual day parking, a one entry one exit ticket will be available from the machine upon entry. Those parking will need to pay \$10 on departure at the pay stations which are located at the lifts as you are exiting. Note that the \$10 ticket is a one entry and one exit ticket so if you intend to leave between sessions you will be required to pay a second \$10 parking fee.

PLAYER NUMBERS FOR THE TEAMS USING BRIDGEMATE II

During the team events, when you turn on the Bridgemates, you will be asked to enter your player numbers. This is NOT your ABF number. Each player in every team has been assigned a number. These will be found on the bright orange sheet which will be on your table at the start of play. NS at the home table should enter the player numbers for the players in your own team.

The reason for this is that, if done correctly, the scoring team will produce a summary of the results for each pair in your team, comparing their results against the average score across your section on each board (the datum). These results have no official status and are just for your own interest. It is a service we are happy to be able to provide, but in order to take advantage of it, it is important that the player numbers are accurately entered each round.

Our observations from recent years show that over 90% of teams sit in the same seats for the whole event. To simplify the process for entering player numbers for these teams, from Round 2 onwards if your team is sitting in the same seats as in Round 1, you may just enter "1" for all four players. The unit will display "same as Round 1" as the player names and the system will correctly record the pairs.

WEB RESULTS PAGE

On the 2017 GCC Results Page, http://www.qldbridge.com/gcc/results2017.php, there is an option, "Individual Player Results." Click on this and enter your surname or ABF number (or anyone else whose results you may be interested in). You will now see a list of every session in which you played at the 2017 GCC, your score, the number of masterpoints won, and a link to your scorecard for the session. (This page will be updated at the end of each day's play.)

IF YOU ARE "CONNECTED".....

The draw for the next round in the Teams and Swiss Pairs events will be published on the web at exactly the same time it is displayed on the projector screens at the venue. So if you are "connected" you can check your standings and the draw online. Alternatively download the Apple/Android App!! – see details on page 18.

BAR

CORRECTING SCORES

After each session, a printout of the results for each pair or team will be made available. For the last session of a stage of an event, you may obtain a copy on request from the Scoring Enquiries Desk located outside the scoring room just inside the doors in the centre of the playing area.

If you believe that there is a mistake, you need to follow this procedure:

- 1. on the board where you believe that there was an error, agree with your opponents that the score was entered incorrectly;
- 2. make the correction on your printout and have them sign it;
- 3. give the corrected printout to the Scoring Liaison Officer, Toni Bardon, under the sign "SCORING ENQUIRIES" outside the scoring room just inside the door in the centre of the playing area. She will check that you have provided all the necessary information. The correction will be made by the scorers during the following session and a new personal printout will be made available for you to collect.

Agreed scoring errors need to be advised within the scoring correction period for the session in which the error occurred. The scoring correction periods are displayed prominently near the scoreboards. At the conclusion of the scoring correction period, scores become final and, under the Laws of Bridge, no further changes can be made. This is critical for the last rounds when the correction period is limited and scorers may not pick up anomalies. You are responsible for your own actions - or lack thereof.

World Championships have been awarded based on scoring errors. E/W Pairs should not simply acknowledge the scores on the Bridgemates, but should carefully check them as incorrect scores, apart from affecting the results of the event which may involve others not related to the scoring error, but may also affect: draws for teams and Swiss Pairs events, Masterpoints, Playoff Qualifying Points.

SYSTEMS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Each pair is required to have two current ABF approved, systemically identical system cards on the table for the opposing pair before the start of each round. Overseas players will be permitted to use WBF system cards.

Subject to protection, **GREEN, BLUE** and **RED** systems as well as **BROWN Sticker** conventions may be used during the Open Pairs and Teams, Seniors Pairs and Teams, Intermediate Pairs and Teams, Seres-McMahon Swiss Pairs, Ivy Dahler Open Swiss Pairs, Ivy Dahler Intermediate Swiss Pairs, Weekend Matchpoint, Monday Butler Swiss Pairs and Under 500MP events. (Note: protection will not be available for the major final of the Open Pairs).

Only **GREEN** and **BLUE** systems may be used during the Restricted Pairs and Teams, Novice Pairs and Teams, Rookie Pairs, Friday Novice Pairs, Ivy Dahler Restricted Swiss Pairs and Under 50 Masterpoint Pairs.

YELLOW systems will only be permitted in the Open Teams from Round 3 onwards and not against teams with a current position in the lower two thirds of the field (decimals rounded up).

Teams proposing to use YELLOW systems should have already lodged an adequate copy of their system (including a bona fide suggested defence) with the CTD before 10:00am on Tuesday 7th February 2017. Such systems are available for inspection as well as posted on the Gold Coast Congress website using the information tab.

BROWN STICKER

Some overcalls and 2-level openings attract a **BROWN sticker**. Weak 2-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO & Myxo Twos, etc.) are **BROWN sticker**. Pairs should attach **BROWN** spots to their cards. Also, multi one-level overcalls are **BROWN**, though gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 1♣ are not. Please also note that a Multi 2♦ (or 2♣) showing a Weak Two in either major is an exemption from the **BROWN Sticker** category.

PROTECTED PAIRS

Pairs playing a **GREEN** system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below Life Master or one is below State Master.

This affords protection from **BROWN Sticker** conventions in all events where they are permitted with the exception of the major Final of the Open Pairs.

ALERTS - SUMMARY

PRE-ALERTS

List your unusual or complex treatments in the pre-alerts section of the system card. For instance – RCO 2s, Bergen raises, DONT Dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc).

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Announce the number of clubs contained in a 1♣ opening and the HCP range of a 1NT opening. Those playing a strong club system just need to announce 1♣ as "Strong 16+".

ALERTS DURING THE AUCTION

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

DON'T ALERT:

- Any double or redouble
- Any call beyond 3NT, except a conventional opening bid
- A bid of a suit bid or shown by an opponent
- Any 24 response to a INT opening bid in an uncontested auction (e.g. Stayman)
- Any Jump Raise in a contested auction

For our New Zealand players We do NOT use STOP Cards

DO ALERT:

All other conventional calls (such as *Transfers*, 2♥=hearts and *a minor etc.*)

'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).


IF PARTNER STUFFS UP

Declarer/Dummy: If partner fails to alert or provides a wrong or misleading explanation, you should wait until the *end of the auction* before calling the Director and correcting.

Defenders: wait until the *end of the hand* before piping up.




THE KLINGER QUIZ

Ron Klinger



West leads the 4♣. East takes the ♣A and returns the ♣10, ducked to West's ♣Q. The third club is won by South's ♣K, dummy discarding the ♠J and East playing the ♣3. South continues with the ♦2. What should West play?

Solution:



As the cards lie it would work to play the ♦Q, but that would look silly if South began with A-J-x-x. The important point is not to play the ♦9, as that will allow declarer to duck in dummy. East wins but has no more clubs and West has no entry to the club winners.

Declarer clearly has 4+ diamonds and the HCP shown by East indicates South has the ◆A.

West should play the ◆10. Declarer cannot afford to duck this in case East began with ◆J-9. If declarer plays the •K, the contract will be one down.




You are the East defender and have just won the ninth trick of the hand defending no trumps. How do you play to make sure that you win three of the four remaining tricks?



BRIDGE WITH BARRY

At the fall nationals of 2014 the Sunday evening pairs game showed a deal where the result as presented by Deep Finesse was rather surprising – and worth a second look.



I was East and my partner, Eric Leong, found the best defence against 4.

He cashed the \P K, the \P A, \P K, then played a second diamond. Declarer won the \P Q, led the \P 5 to the king and tried to cash red-suit winners. East ruffed in and was over-ruffed, but without the \P 5, declarer could not get to dummy, so there was a club to lose at the end.

So what did declarer do wrong? The answer is that the trump spots turned out to be critical. The best way to play the contract is to assume 3-2 spades with the queen onside. You lead the \$\infty\$8 to the king and start leading winners from dummy. When East ruffs in, high or low, you over-ruff and draw a second trump then go back to dummy with the \$\infty\$6 to take your last discard and finally take the club finesse.

BE GUIDED BY BRENT

What you need to know Part 1 – Brent Manley

I like to start each of these essays with an amusing story – a reminder that bridge is supposed to be fun.

This happened many years ago. A newcomer to bridge was enjoying a game on a cruise ship. There was an irregularity at the table, and the newcomer knew she was supposed to do something. The trouble was that she couldn't remember what that was. Finally, she called out, "Innkeeper!"

At this tournament, calling for the innkeeper won't get the job done. At the Gold Coast Congress, officials are known as tournament directors – they are the bridge equivalent of referees or umpires. Although the directors are there to help, many a new player is reluctant to call a TD when something goes wrong. Perhaps it is an insufficient bid. Maybe it's a lead out of turn, or a revoke. The reluctant director-callers have the view that calling a TD is the equivalent of criticizing the opponents or indicating that maybe they're not on the up and up.

I have been playing bridge for more than 45 years. Over those decades, I have formulated a policy that works. This is it:

It is a mistake to make your own rulings. Don't do it. Call the director.

No matter how simple the situation might seem, let the director take care of it. There may be some aspect of the situation you don't know about. For example, do you know the difference between major and minor penalty cards? Did you know that if an opponent exposes a card during play that you as declarer have some options if the partner of that player gains the lead? For even experienced players, the laws can be complicated. The TDs running your game have studied the laws and their complexities, and they know many details you don't. Let them do their jobs.

Digression: I must include a story from my early days of tournament play that involves the laws. My partner and I were in a Swiss teams at a low-level tournament. Our opponents were vulnerable, we were not. The man on my right opened 1♠ and I passed. His partner bid 3♠, forcing to game. My partner bid 3NT, showing the minors. The man bid 4NT, Blackwood. I had a huge fit for clubs, so I took the premature sacrifice by bidding 6♣. Opener's partner doubled, my partner passed, and the opening bidder . . . also doubled!

When the director came and heard what happened, he ruled that the second double was cancelled and, if the opening bidder passed, I could require them to defend 6\$\,\text{undoubled}\$ undoubled (the rules since changed). I went down three for minus 150, which I thought was a triumph, considering that the opponents had an easy plus 1430. All we had coming was the \$\,\text{A}\$.

My elation was short-lived, however. During the comparison, our teammates confessed that they had a bidding misunderstanding on the board in question and bid 7♠, doubled by the player holding the trump ace. That was minus 200. Instead of a 15-IMP gain, we had an 8-IMP loss. At least I came away from it with a good story.

One other thought about director calls and the laws. Despite what you might think, the laws are not designed to "punish" players who make mistakes. The laws are meant to define proper procedure and to rectify situations where non-offenders may have been damaged. It is not insulting to the opponents to call for a director when there has been an irregularity. It's the smart thing to do.

DIRECTOR'S TIP Claim By Declarer

- When a claim is made by Declarer, they must state their proposed line of play. This should make mention of any outstanding trumps (e.g. "drawing trumps"), and how they plan to travel between hands if relevant.
- A careless or incomplete claim may cost you tricks that you would otherwise make.
- Claims should be made where possible it is discourteous to continue play when the outcome is certain.

> Helping children affected by domestic violence get back to school

My name is Carmel Martin and I'm a bridge player and the treasurer of Zephyr Inc. Last year the QBA, under the auspices of Theresa Tully, Keith McDonald and Kim Ellaway sponsored Zephyr as the charity to be supported at the Gold Coast Congress. Owing to the huge support and generosity shown by the bridge community, \$9500.00 was raised. All of that money has been used to do a great deal of good.

I'll repeat a little of what I told you last year to refresh the memory of those who aren't familiar with Zephyr's work.

In April 2013, my sister, Isabella, read an article in the Courier Mail highlighting the plight of mothers and their children arriving

at domestic violence shelters, often with only the clothes on their backs. The article made a plea for essential school items for the children, such as school bags and shoes.

A drastic consequence of the upheaval in the lives of these children is that their education is often severely disrupted. This makes their transition to a new school in a new location far more difficult, firstly because without the proper clothing and equipment they stand out from the other children at a time when it is important for their self-confidence that they fit in. Secondly, without the relevant text books etc. they will quickly fall behind in their schooling. They encounter many other problems, two examples of which are that without a hat they may run up against the 'no hat no play' rule or without proper school shoes they may not be allowed to play sport.

We decided to set up a charity focusing on supplying uniforms, shoes, text books, stationery, school bags, lunch boxes, water bottles, swim wear and other school items.

Some schools require parents to pay a set fee for resources for particular years, which the school then provides. In these cases we will pay the fee if we have funds available.

Research shows that it is vital for the children's well-being that they get back to school as soon as possible and that they don't stand out from other children at their new school during this difficult time. Therefore, we respond to requests from shelters (usually), within 24 hours.

This charity is all about volunteers. Everyone who works for Zephyr is a volunteer. No one is paid to work or reimbursed for private expenses.

Your Support: As a bridge player, I turned to the bridge community for donations when we realized that the size of the charity was going to go beyond the boundaries of our two families and close friends. The support from the bridge community has been overwhelming, humbling and gratefully received. Apart from the hugely generous financial support we've received, we've been spurred on by the massive endorsement of what we are trying to do. I know I'm talking in superlatives but there are no words to describe the support we are receiving.

At the time of the 2016 Gold Coast Congress we were supporting 16 refuges while at December of 2016, that number had risen to 41 refuges. We are registered to supply refuges in Tasmania and we currently support one of the six in that state. As soon as we confirm that we have the right processes for Tasmania, we are set up to quickly supply the other five refuges.

Our aim is to cover all of Queensland by the end of this year and then the hope is to replicate this simple, highly effective, successful model in other states.

Domestic violence has reached epidemic proportions in Australia and any help you can provide to help children affected by it to get on with their education would be much appreciated.







PROBLEM 1: You are the East defender and have just won the ninth trick of the hand defending no trumps. How do you play to make sure that you win three of the four remaining tricks?

SOLUTION: The challenge here is to take both of your heart tricks. To do this you must force North to lead hearts for you. If you win the ♦A and then play your ♣5 North must win their ♣A. They will then only have their two hearts and must play the ♥K or the ♥3. Either way, you will get to win 2 hearts and your ♦A.
