Both matches started an exciting deal where 3NT was going to be hard but not impossible to beat. The curious feature was that in one of the QF matches the opponents saved in 2NT...and made it!

Ware and Stream Team wrapped up 3NT from South on repeated spade leads, when they set up clubs. The declarer for now had the $\uparrow 9$ established as an extra winner to take three spades, go with three clubs and three red suit winners.
In one match that was worth 6 IMPs when $2 v$ made 140 at the other table. But against 2NT by East, reached after a Marshall Lewis Multi, when David Wiltshire as West bid 2NT and Max Henbest tried 2NT, Maurits van der Vlugt led a low diamond and ducked $₫ Q$ at trick two. Now declarer set up spades and should still have only seven tricks, until he was allowed to score a second diamond trick. That meant +120 and 11 IMPs.
Henbest/Wilshire pushed to a thin game on the next deal, as did Vanessa Brown/Pete Hollands. With trumps 32 and a finesse working they brought home 10 tricks easily and added another handy swing to their lead.
It became 25-0 when Lewis had an opportunity to overturn received wisdom on the following deal.

On lead to $1 \boldsymbol{1}-1 \mathrm{NT}-2 \boldsymbol{}$ most people put a small trump on the table first then sort their hand later. Marshall tried the K and pressed on with the suit when on lead at trick three after winning the $\uparrow \mathbf{Q}$. -110 later he may not have been wiser but was surely sadder. I make the current count 'Received Wisdom 1, Lewis 0'.
Lewis went some way to getting his own back with a lead directing overcall on $\$$ AK62 in his opponents' $2 / 1$ auction to ensure his side cashed their four top winners against a game. That this was necessary was shown when at the other three tables a 24 response to 14 inhibited one of the two killing leads, and the unlucky player on lead had to pick between 109 x and $\downarrow 9 \mathrm{x}$, and got it wrong of course.

Terje Lie and GeO Tislevoll reached 3NT with a combined 21-count when Tislevoll showed clubs then spade shortness facing a $2+1 \%$ opener. There was no defence to this contract; but you can hardly blame Lewis for jumping to 3 (invitational) facing a 1 opener, and playing there.
Sven-Ake Bjerregard/Alon Apteker also reached 3NT after the 1\& opener, but bizarrely, in the other room without anyone doing anything ridiculous, the final contract was...3NT by West!!

After a top club lead ducked and a heart shift, declarer led a spade to his hand and had a fifth trick, then a second spade. North pitched an encouraging diamond, but South for some reason won and played back a heart. Declarer won in hand and set up spades, and had achieved a more than respectable seven tricks, and a 10 IMP gain. Who out there doesn't believe in 'declarer's advantage'?
At the end of the first 12-board stanza Ware led big, The Stream Team were in front by 18-10 against Apteker.

## OPEN TEAMS QUARTER FINAL - SET 2 OF 2

The second half of the round of six matches saw van der Vlugt land a few punches but concede rather more haymakers in return.

Our other match was far closer. Apteker took the lead when Jenner-O'Shea/Doecke had the sequence:

And the partnership were not in agreement as to whether this was a strong hand with diamonds (maybe with a three-card spade raise) or a strong four-card spade raise. That led to 4- on a 4-3 fit down on a ruff, while 3NT was easy as the cards lay.
After Apteker had added a partscore swing, the lead increased on the next deal when the same pair attempted a slam missing the requisite number of keycards.
The next board was flat, in entertaining fashion (unless you were sitting East or West)

Both tables saw West hear $1 \uparrow$ to his left, doubled by his partner. He bid $2 \boldsymbol{\%}$, then competed to $3 \%$ over $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ and sold out to 34.

Both Easts led a top heart and received clear discouragement. Both followed what seemed like the logical but spectacularly unsuccessful defence of underleading in clubs for the heart shift. They might have argued that this defence could produce four tricks but was unlikely to lead to a fifth. As you can see, either a spade or a diamond play at trick two yields a fifth trick.
By the time the final deal had been reached Apteker led by 13 IMPs.


After Hinge, West, opened 3 Noah Apteker and Rob Stephens bid:

The slam needed spades to behave, and after a club lead 11 tricks were the limit. Jenner-O'Shea/Doecke also faced a 3 preempt. Their sequence was:

Had Doecke bid $6>$ over $6 \leqslant$ I would think Alon Apteker might have led a spade or diamond rather than a club, but you never know. 6NT on a diamond lead would have escaped for 300, I think. After a spade lead and diamond shift declarer had 11 tricks but no more. That was 2 more IMPs for Apteker, who won 39-24.

## SPELLER SQUAD EARNS NOVICE TEAMS TITLE

After 12 rounds of Swiss teams qualifying for the knockouts, teams captained by Daphne Young and Colin Speller were leading the field (Young at No. 1) and thereby destined to face each other in the championship round on Friday.
In the final, Speller jumped out to an early lead and held on for an impressive 146-64.1 victory.
Speller played with Jodie Gudaitis, Colin Kleinig and Jane Stephens. Young's teammates were Sheila Parsons, Andrea Pappas and Speros Pappas.
The Speller team started strong, leading 43-0 going into the second set. Young and company cut the margin to 38 IMPs by winning the second set 31-26. This board, played by Andrea and Speros Pappas against Kleinig and Stephens, helped the Young rally.

Kleinig led the $\$ 3$, taken in dummy with the ace. Andrea cashed the top two spades in dummy, then played a trump to her jack. With all enemy trumps accounted for, she played a diamond to dummy's king. When the queen dropped, she was able to claim 13 tricks for plus 1010. It was an 11-IMP loss, however, because at the other table Speller and Gudaitis reached the grand slam, making, for plus 1510.
Speller was ahead 69-31.1 going into the third set. When the set was over, the Young team's dreams of a title began to fade. Speller won that set 71-10, scoring four double-digit swings (two of the slam variety).

At one table, the Speller team got to 4 on the East-West cards, taking all the tricks on the lead of the $\&$. At the other table, Speros Pappas opened 14 as dealer and soon found himself in $6 \boldsymbol{\omega}$ after Andrea checked for key cards via 4NT. Speros made a valiant try after the $\$$ Q was led, but he ended up one trick short for minus 50 and an $11-\mathrm{IMP}$ loss. We can all see that with the A onside, declarer can establish his $12^{\text {th }}$ trick by leading a diamond to the king. But if the clubs were not 7-1 you could survive the $\downarrow$ A offside by pitching a diamond on the $\$ \mathrm{~K}$ before drawing trump, then playing on a cross ruff.
The Young team won the fourth and final set 23-6, but it was not enough. This board was one of the highlights for the losing team in that last set:

Speros led the $₫ A$ and another spade. After winning the $₫ K$, Andrea smoothly switched to a low diamond. Kleinig put in the jack, taken by Speros with the queen. He returned a diamond to his partner's ace and then ruffed the diamond return. That was plus 200 and a 6-IMP swing for the Young team because Young and Parsons were plus 50 at the other table after defeating $4 \uparrow$ by East.

Suggestions from the kibitzers that he had sorted his six spades into a three-card spade suit and three-card club suit seems unlikely...the fact remains that facing a 2-4-2-5 17-count with wasted heart values 4 was still a decent contract, but he never found a way to introduce his spades. When Noah Apteker overcalled in clubs, he put the dummy down. $3 *$ duly made but Bach had 10 IMPs since $4 \%$ was bid and made in the other room.
The Apteker team recovered the IMPs with interest on the next deal, a slam hand with the only possible losers in trumps, where your holding was: Q107 facing A9854

Running the queen first is a $75 \%$ chance; against lesser opponents leading up to the 10 is a fraction worse but gives you much more table action to make it my preferred play. Alex Antonios played $\vee$ A and another heart, which is clearly a lower percentage line; the cards did not forgive, with the K-J-third situated over the Q10. Incidentally if you do lead low to the 10 your RHO could give you nasty problem by winning the king! Maybe it's best to play percentages after all.

The teams then traded four double digit swings over the next five boards (one of the quieter deals being where Antonios/Edgtton went for 800 while Apteker/Bjerregard were letting through 24x for 670 !). On the first of the big swings Bjerregard/Aptker bid to a vulnerable 3NT, but alas their diamond suit of Q1098xxx facing KJx did not run for no losers. The opponents set up spades, got in with $\downarrow$ A and cashed out both black suits for 400 , while 4. was going down the other way.

Then a four-card major 14 opening in third seat from Noah Apteker with both sides vulnerable got Stephens to bounce to 4 on a six-count. Doubled and down 800...No?

On a helpful lead declarer wrapped up 680. It didn't hurt that declarer's three small clubs were facing a void. (For the record this proved a swing in similar fashion for Ware against Ashton.)
That same partnership returned the favour a couple of deals later when a system accident saw Apteker pass what Stephens had intended as a transfer. That made it 46-35 for Apteker, but the heart suit seemed designed to victimize Antonios:

40 seems a good spot on the E/W cards but after South has overcalled 1 over 1 he led a diamond and received his ruff, cashed \&A and exited in clubs in one room, in spades in the other. Bjerregard led a heart to the queen, Antonios to the ace. It certainly isn't clear what is best, as opposed to winning, but Apteker had 12 more IMPs to make it 58-35.
It looked like Apteker would take a big lead to the first break, but some wild pre-empting from Apteker/Bjerregard led to an 1100 penalty against a game on the final deal, and the lead was down to 58-48.

Brown had a maximum for his no-trump opener but unspectacular trumps. Two deals later Brown went low again, but this time he misjudged the position - somewhat unluckily to my mind. At three of the four tables North opened 4 (which I prefer to Ashton's 14) and at those tables West balanced with 54. Two of the three Souths bid on to 54 and played there doubled. Partner had the perfect hand to justify your choice, but 5 was still on a finesse. Brown doubled $5 \&$ and the defenders cashed out for 100 , but that was still 11 IMPs away. Apteker were back up by 11 IMPs.

Hans' decision to move over the signoff with no first round control in any of the side-suits just looks wrong to me. Hung clearly expected his keycards to offer play for slam. And indeed, it was a $75 \%$ slam - though a diamond lead looks unlikely to be right. Tislevoll was dealt a very unlucky hand to lead from; a club looked safe a heart dangerous, so he fished out a club and declarer claimed 1460.
Ware psyched a heart cuebid en route to slam...just in case. Well done, but only for a flat board.
Both pairs in Apteker-Bach played 4\$ when West could not cooperate over a 4\& slam-try.
A very thin slam came home for Ashton-Gill on the last deal of the set. They needed KJ3 facing A754 to play for four tricks - or a for the hand with the fourth club to be squeezed in clubs and hearts - about a $1 / 3$ rd chance in all. Today was their lucky day with Qxx in the slot so they broke for the final set having taken a 29-20 lead. Meanwhile Apteker led 73-60 with 12 deals to go.

Where Ashton played Ware, Fleisher opened 1\&, and when South overcalled a comic 1NT (natural 15-18, or a 1 -suited hand, or a 2-suited hand) his RHO transferred into hearts. Fleisher doubled in the pass out seat, and Hung was happy to pass and lead a club. The defenders have four aces and kings to cash and at least two trump tricks, but when Fleisher continued clubs at trick two declarer played his $\$$ K and pitched dummy's diamond on the $\& \mathrm{Q}$ as Hung ruffed in. When a low diamond came through, Ware discarded a spade from dummy and ducked a spade. Hung took his king and led a spade to Fleisher's ace. The $\boldsymbol{J}$ let Hung pitch a diamond. Declarer ruffed a spade to hand with $\vee$ A, ruffed another diamond, ruffed a spade with $\vee 9$ and could take two more trump tricks in the ending for down one.
In the other room Gill as South heard his partner use Stayman after his 1NT overcall. He bid $2 \checkmark$ and corrected $2 \vee$ to 2NT. After the defenders led and continued clubs he drove out the $\star$ A. The fall of the $\$ 10$ and VK meant he had nine tricks and 6 IMPs.

In our other match Bach, East, heard Edgtton double 1NT and now doubled the escape to $2 \boldsymbol{\top}$. He led $¥ K$ and when declarer won and played the $\$$ K Edgtton ducked. I'm sure there was a good reason for this play, but it currently eludes me; declarer ruffed out the $\diamond A$ and eventually ruffed a spade with $\vee 9$ as in the other match to neutralize West's trump tricks. The defenders could take their three plain winners and two trump tricks only to concede 470 - for a gain of 12 IMPs .

At the fourth table Bjerregard, East, doubled Whibley's $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ opener (majors). West ran to $3 \star$, Brown awarded it a red card. On a club lead Brown won to play trumps, and declarer scored his two spade tricks and two aces and a trick in the wash for 1100 .
On our next exhibit it was very hard for the defenders to find a way to cash their tricks against no-trump:

In Ashton-Ware both Souths opened 2 and when West bid 2NT North raised to 3 . Fleisher and Henbest doubled; Hung opted to defend, Wiltshire tried 3NT and won the spade to cross to a diamond and run the \&Q. When North won and played a spade declarer claimed nine tricks. Against $34 \times$ Hung led a top trump, and the shift to $\triangle Q$ came too late. Declarer won and played another trump won by Hung, who's last resort was for a misguess in the clubs and underled his \&A. Declarer rose ace and could now throw away his other club on dummy's fourth heart and made an overtrick. That was 630 and 14 IMPs to give Ware back the lead.

Defending 3NT on the same auction as above Whibley led a spade to his partner's eight. When declarer crossed to a diamond to play clubs, Whibley shifted to hearts and the defenders cashed out. That was good only for a flat board since 5 in the other room received a trump lead, but Stephens shifted to hearts on winning $\$ \mathrm{~K}$.
The action continued apace, with the deals apparently loaded with swing potential. In Ashton-Ware both N/S pairs played $50 \times$ after competing over 5 (the contract was not doubled at either table in our other match).

And right he was. $4 \oplus$ went just one down in the other room, so that was only a 4 IMP swing but a well-deserved one. On the next deal there may not appear to be much positional advantage as to which way you play 3NT with the E/W cards; but look again.

Andy Hung played 3NT as West on a club lead and the defenders cashed out for two down - and it could have been worse. That was worth 9 IMPs to Ware when in the other room Gill's three-suited 2 opener saw him buy the contract in 2 on an incisive trump lead. Declarer scored four spades and a club but that was it.
Whibley led a trump against 5 after which even with the heart finesse working declarer had only three hearts and seven diamond tricks. But 3NT by Bach after a natural 2\& opener by Stephens (2*-2-Pass-3NT) was not a bad spot, especially after the $\&$ Q lead. Bach ran the diamonds, South pitching two clubs then a heart and
spade, and Bach took a while, as is his wont. Eventually he settled for simplicity and finessed in hearts for his game swing.

All four tables reached $4 \checkmark$ here. Where in one case a diamond, and in another case the $\$ \mathrm{~A}$ was led, declarer basically needed to draw two rounds of trumps and take the club finesse. That worked; +620 for Ashton and Bach. In the other matches a club was led - in one case by East in the other case by West. Where Stephens was declarer as South he tried three rounds of clubs at once, hoping both defenders would follow or that the ruff would come with the trump trick. Where Jacob as North was declarer he also finessed at trick one. With a 1 opener to his left, he might well have played two rounds of trumps then come to the $\boldsymbol{\$} \mathrm{K}$ to cash clubs; but why would clubs be $5-2$ here? He too played clubs before trumps and went down one.
Ware now led by $56-55$ with two deals to go. Board 35 was decisive:

That escaped for down one, but with game his opponents way no play that rated to be expensive...but just how expensive? Hung as West did not rebid 3NT. He chose the more restrained $3 \leqslant$ call. Now Fleisher thought this showed extra values so he raised to $4 \downarrow$, and when Hung bid $5 \leqslant$ Jacob awarded it the red card. The defenders cashed one spade then two clubs, and took three trump tricks for 1100 . Those 15 IMPs tied up the match for Ware. They would play Bach in the final, the latter having taken the final set 42-7 to emerge more comfortable winners than had seemed likely at any point in the match.

Your auction to 3NT is unopposed after you open a weak no trump, and West aggressively leads the five of hearts. You capture East's ten with the jack and no doubt will play East for the diamond queen...but can you do better?

Since you have tricks to burn if you can find the diamond queen, but are threatened with five losers if you cannot, win the heart king at trick one and play East for the diamond queen. You hope that if West wins the diamond queen he will lead a low heart to his partner's jack and be disappointed with the result.
(Incidentally, as a point of technique, consider how West should defend if you do win the first trick with the heart jack, and he gets in with the diamond queen. He wants to find partner with a quick entry, and the best chance is that he can lead to his partner's ace of clubs, for East to switch back to hearts. There is a danger that East will not find the switch, but will return a club instead; West can reduce that risk by switching to the club eight, to show no interest in that suit.)

Have You Discussed? Part 8: Competing Effectively
In today's game, it's important to compete. If you sit by and pass whenever the opponents open the bidding, your results will suffer. Getting into the opponents' auction takes away some of their options and makes it tougher for them to get to the best contract.

One of the most effective weapons you can employ is the weak jump overcall. This takes up the opponents' bidding space and makes them guess more often as they strive to get to the best spot.
Say you hold this hand: Q 10975 - 2 K 975
Your right-hand opponent opens $1 \&$. This is a classic bid of 2 , usually showing a six-card suit - with seven, you would probably bid 3 - and without much in the way of defense.

You might have some trepidation if your side is vulnerable and the opponents are not, but if you have an aggressive style and a partner who is okay with occasional bad results, you can make life difficult for the opponents by bidding with hands like this. If partner has a couple of spades and some other high cards, you might even make your contract.
Bear in mind that when you bid $2 \boldsymbol{1}$, unless 2NT is an option for one of the opponents, any bid they make will be at the three level - which might be an uncomfortable spot.
With vulnerability in your favour - they are, you aren't - you can make a weak jump overcall with even fewer HCP than shown in the example.

Discuss with partner what a weak jump overcall by either of you will deliver, especially when your side is vulnerable.

## Options when you overcall

The overcall has two important goals: indicating a lead and suggesting a suit for competing. This hand is generally considered to be a minimum overcall of 1中 over 1\& with neither side vulnerable:
© A Q 764 -942 Q 965 \& 6
Some would argue that the spade suit should be a bit more robust, perhaps a hand such as
-A Q 985 4 4 443 \&K 84
In almost all cases, a one-level overcall should be based on a five-card suit, although a strong four-card suit e.g., vA K Q 10 - that can be bid at the one level, non-vulnerable, would be acceptable. Make sure partner is okay with this action.

When you bid at the two level, especially when you are vulnerable, the requirements are significantly different. This is an important point to discuss with your partner. For starters, a vulnerable two-level overcall should be based on a suit of at least six cards with a strong suit - something like A K J 1096 in an otherwise strong hand (opening strength or better).
If partner can count on you to have such a hand when you overcall at the two level, her bidding will be more accurate.

When you are the advancer (partner of the overcaller), it's important for you to raise when you can, perhaps further disrupting the opponents' auction, but you must let partner know when you have more than a courtesy raise.

Suppose you hold: $\quad$ A J 3 VQ J 87 -K 986 \$62
Your left-hand opponent opens 1\& and partner overcalls 1『. RHO passes. You have a clear-cut bid of 2\&. This cuebid shows a raise with at least 10 support points - high cards plus points for distribution. This action will get your side to game when you have the assets to make it.

In the final of a National Teams, West did well to continue with the $\$ \mathrm{~K}$ at trick 2, but then slipped from grace by switching to the 4 .
Declarer captured East's $\$$ K and cashed the hearts to pitch a diamond. South was able to take a ruffing finesse against West's $\& \mathrm{Q}$ later and so lost no club trick.
West can defeat 4 by switching to $\star A$ and the $\leqslant 9$ at tricks 3 and 4 , but this is risky and there is no rush for that. A heart shift will also work, but there is a clue from East's carding in trumps. East played $\mathbf{\$} 3$ at trick 1 and the $\oplus 9$ at trick 2. Had East wanted a heart switch, he might have played $\uparrow 9$, then $\uparrow 3$.
Once you opt for a club shift at trick 3, you may as well lead the $\&$ Q. South can win and take a diamond discard on the hearts, but with only one trump left in dummy, South is bound to lose a diamond and a club later (or two diamonds).
Wit: Often in evidence at the bridge table to the extent of $50 \%$.
